THE GREAT FIRE.

Printers Burnt Out

People Die of Fright and Exposure.

St. John's, Nfld., July 12. Every lawyers office, doctor's residence and office, and Protestant clergyman's residence was burned during the fire. Every daily newspaper and every printing office in the city has been destroyed. There is not enough type, paper or ink remaining in the city sufficient for printing a single poster. Several homeless persons have died in consequence of fright and exposure. Most of the people are temporarily housed in sheds and tents now, but provisions and clothing are badly needed for them. An insurance agents meeting showed the losses of those insured in agencies here to amount to a total of four and a quarter millions of dollars. The estimated total loss is fifteen millions. Several persons have been sent to the lunatic asylum in consequence of the terrible shock they received from the fire. The heavy rain which has set in has ended all dangers from forest fires.

WELL DONE HALIFAX.

Supplies for St. John's.

HALIFAX, July 12. This city has already contributed ten thousand dollars in relief for the St. John's sufferers.

The Dominion Government has sent a steamer to Newfoundland loaded with supplies for the sufferers.

The Upper Canadian papers extol the prompt and generous action of the people of Halifax as an unprecedented act of generosity.

THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

Gladstone Will Have a Small Majority.

LONDON, July 12. The total return of elections held up to date shows that the Conservatives have secured 198 seats; the Liberals, 165; the McCarthys, 30; Liberal Unionists, 27; and the Nationalists, 5. The return to Parliament of Mr. Gladstone by a small majority, is now generally admitted to be almost a certainty.
