Second Hunt Fails to Find Girl Missing Two Weeks

MONTAGUE — About 100 volunteer searchers led by the RCMP failed to find any trace of a girl missing for nearly two weeks yesterday.

The search was called off Sunday evening after the long search party combed thoroughly all woodlands, barns and buildings for a considerable distance around the area where Ellen Williams of Beach Point was last seen on Aug. 2.

A police led party also searched an area between Beach Point and Montague last Sunday morning for nearly two weeks.

The girl was last seen on the Wood Islands road in Montague. Police earlier said there has been no indication of food, pills, money or other items which was being held on the island from Hamilton, Ont. where she is employed.

LONDON, Ont. (CP) — Reg Taylor of South Africa, using new and borrowed clubs throughout the tournament, won the Canadian amateur golf championship Saturday by defeating veteran Tom Draper of Royal, Mich. 4 and 2 in the 36-hole final.

His match, followed by a gallery of upward of 3,000, ended amply tonight with a touch of drama for the imperial crowds who were plauding his trim, muscular and by his portly opponent.

The six-foot-two Draper, 30, weighed in at 200 pounds and was a professional golfer. He had won the title in 1958 and 1961.

World Marks Topple At U.S. Swim Meet

CHICAGO (AP)—Mary Stewart of Vancouver and Wilfrid Uescheit of West Germany, led assaults on the records Saturday at the National Amateur Swimming Championships.

Miss Stewart, a slim 16-year-old, bettered all existing listed marks in the 100-metre butterfly with a time of one minute, 7.6 seconds, in the final in the Port Huron, Mich. Olympic pool.

The 100-metre butterfly national U.S. and world record is 1:08.2 set by Susan Doerry of Philadelphia in 1961. Miss Stewart, 16, was fourth in the 100-metre butterfly in 1:08.4. Karly Ellis of Indianapolis was second in 1:08.4 and Carolyn Wood of Portland, Ore., third in 1:09.2.

Although Miss Stewart's feat surpassed the listed records, it was not her best of the year. She was timed in 1:07.3 last month in Vancouver and has been timed in 1:07 for world recognition.

QUEBEC GIRL THIRD
The robust Miss Urselmann, 20, equaled the national and U.S. records in the 100-metre breaststroke by winning the final in 1:26.6. Ingrid Fuernstach, 19, of Hamburg, Germany, who in the semi-final preliminary round in 1:26.7, was second in the final in 1:27.0.

Thirteen in the final was Alison Gleninden, 17, of Hudson Heights, Que., in 1:22.1 in the morning preliminary. English-born Miss Gleninden had equalled Miss Urselmann's official mark of 1:21.8.

The closing meet record in the 100-metre breaststroke is 1:24.4 by Marianne Hargreaves of the U.S. in 1961. The U.S. mark is 1:23.7 by Ann Warner two years ago. The world standard is 1:22.2 by Barbara Goebel in 1961.
