OUR TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

AFTER all The Guardian said and did last spring, and in the years preceding, the Government has not voted a cent towards the improvement of the telegraph service of this Province or the lowering of the rates. The Government voted away FIFTY-FIVE millions of dollars—FIFTEEN MILLIONS more than the "extravagant Conservatives" expended—but not a nickel towards night telegrams for the Guardian or lower rates for the public! All the bluster about the telegraph monopoly—by the way, Sir Louis says there is no monopoly—has ended in nothing! Yet the discreet organ is quite content. It says nothing now about telegrams, and seems to be well pleased when it can get in a word in defence of the Government's hypocrisy and deceit with reference to Protection, extravagant expenditures, high taxes and increasing debt. The wonder is that it does not defend their conduct as to the Plebiscite and National Prohibition, or the jobbery and political corruption of which the flood-gates have been opened by Messrs. Tarte, Sitton and Blair. But this would, perhaps, be going a step too far for the independent and honest men who have, heretofore, given The Guardian their countenance and support. The Guardian is discreet, if it is a supporter of the new Liberals who make such wasteful use of the taxpayers' money!

Concerning the telegraph service there can be no doubt that this province has been shabbily treated. We ought—even if the Government has to pay a trifle out of its \$65,000,000 budget for that purpose—to be put upon an equality with the neighboring provinces in respect to rates. A night service is not much needed, except by The Guardian. But lower rates for day telegrams, sent and received while our merchants are at business, would be a concession to this community that would be really valuable and would be greatly appreciated.

We have repeatedly pointed out that there is but one way by which this concession can be obtained. We might as well talk to the wind as threaten the Anglo-American Telegraph Company. To withdraw their present subsidy and trust to the competition of other telegraph companies would be decidedly risky under existing conditions. The only safe alternative is to add a thousand or two thousand dollars a year to the subsidy which the Anglo-American receives. Sir Louis Davies is well aware of this fact; and in view of the repeated representations of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, backed up by the Press and the business

men of the Province—not to speak of the Guardian—Sir Louis is to be censured for not securing the concession required, when so much public money was being voted away for less needed purposes.

LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION.

We are glad to notice that our friends are getting in line as a fitting response to THE EXAMINER's call of a few days ago. Western information says that the President of the West Prince Association, Dr. Murphy, has called the convention of the West Riding of Prince for August the 22nd inst. We are informed that Geo. V. McInerney, Esq., M. P., for Kent, N. B., one of the cleverest members of the House of Commons, has been invited, and will likely be present, to address the electors of West Prince at O'Leary on the 22nd.

The electors of West Prince are active and energetic, and when the time comes to line up for the general election they will be found ready and willing to accept the gage of battle.

According to THE EXAMINER it condemns the Government because its members throughout twenty long years denounced Protection. That was long ago and while they were in opposition. "They continue to maintain protection," says THE EXAMINER, and it thinks protection a good thing. Now why does not our contemporary give them credit for doing a good thing while in power? We do not think so highly of the protective system as THE EXAMINER does, but that is nothing here or there. Why condemn a party so severely for talking wrong and refuse all credit for doing right? We pause for a reply.—GUARDIAN.

A sufficient reply to this twaddle might be given in another question—"Why condemn a man for stealing a horse to ride to town when he has a horse of his own?—surely it's all right to come to town!"

There can be no doubt that before the last general election, and throughout the twenty years previous thereto, Free Trade was the policy of the Liberal party, and Protection that of the Conservatives. The Liberal leaders (denounced Protection in principle and in practice, persuaded many persons that they were right, that Protection was a curse to the country—and so obtained many votes.

After getting into power by means of these votes, they have thrown Free Trade overboard, have stolen Protection, and are riding prosperously on the Protection horse belonging to their opponents.

But the Guardian cannot see that they have done anything wrong! While we pity the Guardian's moral and mental obliquity, we have no doubt that all intelligent and honest electors see clearly that the men who have done this are not fit to be trusted with the Government of the country.

Deceivers and dishonest upon an important matter of principle and policy, they cannot be expected to be honest and trustworthy in the conduct of the general business of the country. Turn them out.

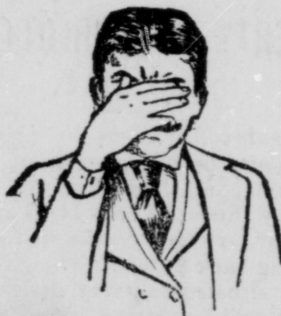
