The Markets.

FISH.

A Boston letter of the 22nd inst. reports that the American shore fleet continues to make a very good catch. The receipts at Boston for the week ending on the 22nd amounted to 10,876 barrels against 4,503 for the same week last year. Notwithstanding the large receipts, and the prospects of a future catch, prices are held firm and stock is sold rapidly as offered. The quotations are \$3 25 to \$5.50 per barrel for Nova Scotia 3's. Shore mackerel are selling at \$4.75 to \$5 for 3's; medium 3's \$5.75; and \$8 to \$9 for 2's.

Lobsters are a little quiet in Boston, as buyers have reduced their views on large lots of labelled to \$1.25 per doz. Some sales are being made at this figure, though most holders are asking \$1.30.

EGGS.

In Boston the market for eggs is good, and P. E. Island and Nova Scotia stock is in good demand at 19 and 19 1/2 cents per dozen.

OATS.

The oat market in England has improved in consequence of the excitement caused by the Egyptian difficulty. Prices offered for English ports average from 18s 9d to 19s per quarter of 304 lbs., and for French ports, 19s to 19s 3d. Retail lots are sold in Charlottetown at from 48 to 50 cents per bushel.

FLOUR.

The Montreal Gazette of the 20th inst. says: The flour market remains very dull in sympathy with wheat, as buyers generally are holding off for a steadier condition of things. Values are therefore to a great extent nominal. To effect business, however, holders would be forced to make concessions. The only sales reported on Change were 125 Superior at \$6 25 and 100 medium bakers' at \$6.50. The following are the quotations:—

Notes from Eldon.

Mr. S. Bairnsfather delivered his popular lecture—"A rare time in Scotland"—to a large audience in Moore's Hall, on Wednesday night, the 19th inst. As this was Mr. Bairnsfather's second appearance in Eldon, and as the lecture was the old one but slightly changed, that portion of the audience who heard him before, were fully convinced, and perfectly satisfied, that "it was not so young as it used to be."

The members of the Eldon Presbyterian Sunday School held their annual picnic on Thursday last the 20th inst. A large company assembled at the school room, composed of the school members and several of their friends, also a number of the Baptist Sunday School scholars who were present by invitation.

The starting of the express, containing the choir, with banners flying, was the signal for falling in line to drive to the appointed place, Point 1st Light House, where the company duly arrived at 12 o'clock. While tea was being prepared by the more experienced portion of the picknickers, the remainder indulged in the pleasures of swinging, boat-sailing, etc. Tea being over, the interest was centred in the races and games which followed. In the go-as-you-please for all comers, there were three entries, J. M. and K., J. led from the start, M. making an easy second, for K. at the end of the first hundred yards, took to measuring the track, apparently disatisfied with the former measurement which was conducted by the winners. After participation in a few sober, yet entertaining plays, the line was re-formed, the party arriving at Eldon in one season as the shades of evening fell. Then, they dispersed, well pleased with the day's sport.

On the same day, a picnic party from Ugg, passed through Eldon en route for the Pond's Point, where, we understand, they spent a pleasant day.

Irish National Land League.

The Charlottetown Branch of the Land League held its regular meeting in St. Patrick's Hall, on the 24th inst. M. P. Hogan, Esq., President in the chair.

The late Secretary reported the receipt of \$25.00 from the Michael Davitt Branch, at County Line; and, on motion, a vote of thanks was tendered to our co-laborers for the generous remittance.

An address lately delivered by Rev. E. McGlynn, D. D., Pastor of St. Stephen's Church, New York, to an audience of 35,000 persons, at Union Square, in that city, was read by Mr. Cox. This grand effort of the rev. doctor's was replete with most interesting matter relative to the condition of Ireland, past and present.

Mr. Collins delivered a spirited address, in which he depicted the woes of the Irish people from the times of the earliest oppressors and invaders of the country to their present deplorable condition, under an administration calling itself Liberal—which proclaims reform while it inflicts tortures through its agents, on an exasperated population.

Mr. Doherty summed up, in very expressive language, the demoralizing effects of coercive and repressive legislation, freely expressing the belief that they tended to aggravate the feelings of the people; and that they rather incited to the commission of crime than to the promotion of peace.

Mr. Bolger gave a summary of the modes of persecution adopted in Ireland, both by resident and absentee landlords.

Other gentlemen spoke on the propriety of the Land League putting forward its best efforts to enable the Irish people to continue a struggle which, as the history of the last two years proves, has very reasonable prospects of ultimate success.

Lord Dufferin and Said Pacha.

The following story appears in the London "Spectator":—"Lord Dufferin has rarely exhibited his tact and coolness in a more useful manner than in a recent interview with Said Pacha, the Turkish Foreign Secretary. Said was representing that the Sultan did not at all like the despatch of ships to Alexandria, and at last asked him what would follow if, in opposition to the Western Powers, the Sultan were to vindicate his undoubted rights in the matter. Lord Dufferin replied that it might be difficult to foresee the consequences of such a line of action, but that, speaking as a private individual, the loss of Egypt might possibly ensue, and it was, perhaps, from fear of a possible contingency that the British Government had so strongly counselled prudence to the Porte. Said retired, wishing, doubtless, for the old days when he might have impaled the ironical Irishman; but the Sultan took the hint, and did not 'vindicate his undoubted rights' by firing on the British fleet. Even his services in Constantinople do not, however, diminish our regret that the only Irishman who could be set to govern Ireland is employed elsewhere."

In our exchanges we find the following from Troy, N. Y.:

POISONED BY CANNED MEAT.

Troy, July 20.—John Dillon and family, of West Troy, and two visiting children named Manning, at Troy, ate heartily of canned corn beef last week, and were seized with vomiting and terrible pains. Prompt medical attendance relieved them. The family had eaten of the same beef in the afternoon. The poisonous change in the food is supposed to have been due to the action of the heat.

The cans had probably been exposed to the sun in the shop windows. Buyers should be careful to see that the cans they receive are not taken from the windows.

The English Court of Appeals was called upon to decide on the future prospects of a ward, and say whether he had better emigrate to Manitoba with his father or continue as "a student in Devonport Dockyard."

The lad's pay was not sufficient for his maintenance, but then if he remained in the Admiralty he would eventually have a salary of \$1,000 a year. On the other hand, his father's qualification for success for farming in Manitoba was the one on which emigrants usually rely, namely, that he had already failed in the business at home. The scale was ultimately turned by the promise of a relative to maintain the boy until his pay was enough for him to live upon, and the Court decided in favor of the Admiralty.

Before the appearance of the phylloxera in France there were over 700,000 acres of vineyard in the Charantes. Of these three-fourths have been attacked by the pest, 270,000 acres have been completely destroyed, and the insect is now making head at the rate of 95,000 acres annually. The population of these departments has fallen off about 10,000 during the last five years, and thriving, bustling Cognac itself, whose progress some years ago was exciting wonder, and where there were 140 brandy firms, is now on the downward road. All other trades and callings necessarily suffer, and in this town of under 13,000 inhabitants there are at present 810 empty houses to be let or sold.

The Russians cannot deceive Europe, says *Broad Arrow*, by the project of a memorial chapel and monastery, with walls five feet thick and enclosing the only water supply midway in the Shipka Pass. The "monument" would be, virtually, a very substantial fort commanding the Pass.

The German Government is allowed by law to employ the interest on more than \$10,000,000 belonging to the ex-King of Hanover "to avert and combat all undertakings against Prussia." This yields \$450,000 a year for secret service money.
