

Toronto Marlboros In Victory Over Sherbrooke To Lead Series 3-0

TORONTO, Ont., April 17—(CP)—A sharp shooting hand of Toronto Marlboros turned a Maple Leaf at Gardens into a shooting gallery tonight to score a humiliating 11-3 victory over Sherbrooke Saints in the third game of their Eastern Canada senior Allan Cup hockey final.

Marlboros now lead the best-of-seven series 3-0 with the fourth game in Montreal Saturday.

It was the goal-producing stick of 19-year-old George Armstrong, a junior for most of the year, that piloted Dukes goal parade. Army blasted home four goals and assisted on two others to delight the 3,734 hometown fans.

Al Buchanan was right behind Armstrong in the goal as he assisted on two while John McLean, Rocky Sullivan, Flash Hollett, Scotty Mair and Chuck Blair notched singletons.

Scorers for Sherbrooke were Paul Gladu, Reg Sinclair and Jacques Prefontaine.

Danny Lewicki, who rapped in goals which broke up the first two games, was held scoreless though he got four assists tonight.

The hometowns moved into a 5-1 first period lead when Armstrong scored his first two and Blair added the third. In the second session, Sherbrooke got one back when Gladu scored from Bernie Vinet and Adjutor Cote but in the third period, almost from the opening whistle, Saints fell apart and the Mar's moved right in on Paul LeClerc's goal step.

In just over five minutes of play, five goals had been scored, four of them by Dukes. Sherbrooke's Sinclair rapped in the marker that helped the Saints hold some of the goal-getting limelight.

The series thus far has been decided on the edge Marlboros have held in their faster skating. It was the same tonight as at least two goals were scored when Toronto players outskated Sherbrooke checks.

Prefontaine, along with LeClerc in the nets, played good hockey but with the odd exception, the third period outburst by the Marlies was the result of a lack of hustle on the Saints part and the blame could be equally shared by all.

The winner of this series will travel west to meet either Calgary Stampede or Port Francis Canadians in the Allan Cup Final.

Mass-Production Of Baseball Players At Florida Camps

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., April 17—(CP)—Mass-production of baseball players is big business—about \$500,000—in the major leagues with Brooklyn Dodgers, New York Giants and Cleveland Indians using the assembly-line technique on a large scale.

About 1,500 of the estimated 15,000 would-be big-leaguers in Florida the last month or so have gone through their paces at these camps. The Dodgers have made Vero Beach a stopping-off point for tourists and ball fans with a layout that probably only the Buns could dream up. All Dodger farm clubs have trained at the camp.

It isn't known the cost to Brooklyn and the Giants, but Cleveland will pay out almost \$175,000 to operate its baseball factory on the outskirts of Daytona. The Giants' 14 farm clubs trained at Sanford, about 45 miles southeast of here.

The big-league clubs pay all the bills—food, lodging, equipment and travelling expenses. Cleveland's set-up is a city within a city, taking up 1,000,000 square feet at a former naval air base.

There are more than 400 players, coaches and scouts at "Indiansville." The camp has six ball diamonds. It has its own theatre, restaurant, post office, recreation and equipment rooms, laundry and lounges, individual lockers, news-stand, and separate quarters for officials. Majority of the living quarters are two-bunk affairs.

"It doesn't cost a kid a nickel to train here," business manager Eddie Stump said. "We paid \$15,000 for the uniforms alone. They can eat as much as they wish and the only way they can spend money is on soft drinks, cigarets, papers and chocolate bars."

There are 25 camp rules and the 25th is worth mentioning. It reads: "This is our home. Treat it as such and keep it clean. Be a gentleman on and off the field. Your appearance in the lobby and dining room should be neat, smart and big league."

"Eventually you'll be there!" Every player in the camp has that ambition, but so far none have made it. "We still have hope," Stump says.

PORT ARTHUR, April 17—(CP)—Regina Pats tonight blanked Port Arthur Bruins 4-0 to take a one-game lead in the best-of-seven series to determine the Western Canadian finalist for the coveted Memorial Hockey Cup.

Pats won the first game last week, 8-5 and dropped the second 6-3 Saturday. Wednesday they move to Regina for the fourth game. Fifth and sixth games are scheduled for Pats' home ice Friday and Saturday.

"We'll Win Next Two" Red Wings' Prediction

DETROIT, April 17—(AP)—"We'll win the next two games and wind this series up in a hurry."

That's the optimistic prediction of the Detroit Red Wings as they get set to renew their Stanley Cup hockey championship series with New York Rangers here Tuesday night.

A lot of the Detroit confidence is based on the ease with which they took Rangers 4-0 at Toronto Saturday night to move out in front, two games to one, in the best-of-seven series.

Coach Lynn Patrick of New York is the first to admit that his club faces a terrific uphill battle if it wants to get back into the lead in the National Hockey League playoffs.

Patrick had been hopeful of winning the two games which the temporarily-orphaned New Yorkers had to play on Toronto ice, since their home rink at Madison Square Garden is occupied with a circus.

But the best Rangers could do was to gain a split in the two contests. "We figure that with all the rest of the games to be played on Detroit ice, Red Wings have a bit of an advantage now, but maybe we can still grab that cup," Patrick said.

Both clubs obviously are tired after the elongated 70-game N.H.L. schedule and the semi-final series of the championship round. Detroit beat Toronto in seven games and New York bested Montreal in five in that round.

Allies Prepare For Trouble In Berlin

BERLIN, April 17—(Reuters)—British reinforcements stood by today ready to fly into Berlin, while the Western Powers appealed to mothers in the city's Soviet sector to keep their children out of trouble during Communist May Day and Whitman demonstrations.

Maj. Gen. G. K. Bourne, British commandant, said a battalion now in the British zone of Germany is ready to take off for Berlin at short notice to cope with any "unanticipated emergency" during the Whitman "free youth" peace rally May 28.

Bourne said: "By radio propaganda we have been able to get at the mothers of these youths, and we think they have been considerably disturbed."

He was sure west-sector police, issued with tear gas and trained in crowd control, could deal with the Whitman demonstration if it spilled over into their territory, even if it were to involve its sponsors' youth-led marchers.

He asserted the proposed march is part of a secret Communist program drawn up by the East German Communist-controlled Socialist Unity Party last December.

Bourne declared: "This plan, drawn up after the failure of the Soviet blockade, foresees a four-pronged attack, to take advantage of any weakness shown by the Western Allies. The plan was:

"1. To boost the propaganda of the Communist-sponsored National Front.
"2. To infiltrate the political life

Toronto To Permit Sunday Baseball

TORONTO, April 17—(CP)—A by-law permitting Sunday baseball at Toronto's Maple Leaf Stadium was passed today by City Council. The Council turned down an amendment that would have required the Stadium to charge half-price for admission on Sunday.

The Sunday Sports Act passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, allowed municipalities to decide by a referendum vote whether they will allow sports to be played on Sunday.

The Toronto by-law so far allows only the playing of hardball in the Stadium. The by-law specifies no inning may be started after 5:30 p.m.

Win Intermediate Basketball Crown

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., April 17—(CP)—Sault Ste. Marie Algots captured the Canadian Intermediate A basketball crown tonight, rolling to an impressive 73-49 victory over Woodstock, N.B., Senators in the second game of a two-game, total-point series.

Rookie Hopefuls To Get Big Chance As Baseball Season Opens Today

Sport Echoes From Prince County

NEW YORK, April 17—(AP)—Highly-heralded rookie hopefuls such as Sam Jethroe, Bobby Morgan, Al Noren and Luke Easter get their long-awaited opportunity to strut their stuff—for keeps—as the 1950 major league baseball season opens up tomorrow.

This quartet will be among the 64 new faces on opening day to mark a sweeping change in the line-ups of a year ago. Not all of the new faces belong to freshmen, however. A majority are established veterans who've changed uniforms as a result of heavy trading last winter.

Not one of the 16 clubs will field the identical team that opened the 1949 season. Even the pennant-winning New York Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers will have a couple of changes.

The most drastic face-liftings have been made on Boston Braves, New York Giants, Chicago Cubs and St. Louis Browns. Each will have six men who weren't there on inaugural day last year. That excludes the pitchers.

The most significant change will be in the Yankees' center field where Joe DiMaggio will hold forth. The great New York slugger missed the first 65 games of the '49 campaign. Joe's capsule report on his current condition is:

"My heel is all right. My legs are all right and my shoulder is all right. I feel great."

The world champion Yankees pick up right where they left off last October, engaging the Red Sox in a four-game series at Boston. Those two rivals, almost unanimously regarded as the outstanding contenders for the American League flag, fought right down to the final day last year.

The Sox will field the same team which started last year except for Al Zarilla in right field and Billy Goodman at first.

In Cleveland, the Indians will clash with Detroit's improved Tigers. Outfielder Easter, the slugging Negro importation from the Pacific Coast League, and rookie third-baseman Al Rosen will be the sole Cleveland newcomers. The Tigers will show first-baseman Dick Kryhoski and second-baseman Gerry Priddy for the first time. Both came in player trades.

In another American League opener 87-year-old Connie Mack will start his 50th year as manager of the Athletics by leading his Philadelphia team against the Senators in Washington.

Around 26,000 fans, including President Truman, will get their first look at Noren, the young Coast League outfielder who cost Washington \$70,000.

Boston Braves Purchase Pitcher

BOSTON, April 17—(CP)—Boston Braves tonight purchased southpaw pitcher Bob Chipman from Chicago Cubs in a straight cash sale.

Chipman, 30, won seven and lost eight for the lowly Chicagoans last season. He has been a member of the Cubs since 1940.

Awaits Details In Hockey Protest

MIDLAND, Ont., April 17—(CP)—George S. Dudy, secretary of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, said tonight he is awaiting details of two protests arising from alleged use of ineligible players in Eastern Canada playoffs.

Thurso Lumber Kings, he said, have not yet replied to a protest lodged by Rouyn Flashers, Rouyn, in the playoffs, charged that right-winger Maurice Gougeon of Thurso was ineligible because he was not released by Pembroke Lumber Kings until after the Dec. 15 transfer date.

Dudley said he also is awaiting the formal protest of Montreal Canadiens about Guelph Biltmore's use of Cliff Hinks, Jerry Theberg and Andy Bathgate in Memorial Cup competition. Canadiens claim the three are "illegal imports."

Canadiens now lead Guelph two games to one, in a best-of-seven series for the Eastern Canada junior title.
