CANADIAN'S WONDER.

LOYAL men, throughout Canada, are amazed at the shameful position taken by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in respect to the Transvaal Contingent. They wonder why if Canada could raise and send a regiment to the Crimea fifty years ago, she cannot now send one to the Transvaal to fight for the British Empire. They wonder why if Queensland and New Zealand can send soldiers to South Africa, Canada cannot also do so. They wonder, further, how it is that the present government, has upon several occasions provided money to the extent of millions—without formal votes of Parliament—for the promotion of semi-political schemes of their own, and cannot provide a few thousands for the defence and integrity of the Empire and to give evidence that the Imperial idea which Canada has by words done so much to advance will, upon occasion, be advanced by deeds. As to the question of merits in this case there can, as the Mail and Empire remarks, be no doubt that right is on Britain's side, just as it was in the Venezuela controversy. Our fellow-subjects are the victims of gross oppression in the Transvaal. Robbed, threatened and deprived of civil liberties in distinct violation of the Convention and of right, they have called upon the Mother Land to intervene and to secure the redress of their wrongs. No British subject, in the right, applies to Britain in vain; and the case of these people has been taken up, with the result, not merely that relief has been refused, but that new outrages have been perpetrated, and that the neighboring portions of the British Empire are in danger of armed invasion. Australia and New Zealand have already come to the defence of British interests, and to the protection of British lives and British territory. They need no urging. Nor should we. Let our Government then bestir itself, and let it be seen that when one part of the Empire is assailed all are assailed, and all are equally ready to come to the help of the endangered member.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—According to the Toronto Weekly Sun the management of the Toronto Fair has withheld the prizes won by the United States exhibitors of the cattle which were "doctored" to cheat the judges, and ordered further that they shall be excluded from the exhibition for a year.

—Secretary of State Scott says that he only visited Quebec and welcomed the Papal Delegate Falconio as plain R. W. Scott. Whereupon a Quebec paper rises to say that as Scott, even the Great Scott, he would not be let in. The Secretary of State for Canada, alone, got his admittance. Let us hear from Sir Wilfrid next.

—Canada leads the world in the extent of her forests. She possesses 799,230,720 acres of forests land, as against 450,000,000 acres in the United States. Russia is credited with 498,240,000 acres, about 48,000,000 more than the United. India comes next with 140,000,000 acres. Germany has 34,347,000 acres, France 23,466,450, and the British Islands only 2,695,000.

—Apropos of the French boycott of the Riviera during the coming winter, careful calculations show that 270,000 people visit those regions during the season. They spend about £15,000,000, for the majority are rich and luxury-loving. The British contribute £5,000,000, the French £4,000,000, whilst the remaining £7,000,000 is spent by wealthy Russians, Americans, Germans, Austrians, Belgians, Dutch, and a very few Italians. It is doubtful whether these figures will be attained this year.

—La Patrie publishes a despatch from Ottawa saying that the article in the Military Gazette which states that the Government would not confer the command of a Canadian contingent on a Canadian is attributed to General Hutton, who, it says, "must be made to understand that he is not the master of our destinies." The General had better look out for himself. He mustn't dare to trench upon the prerogatives of Mr. Tarte! Tarte is "master,"—so long as Laurier reigns. Let that be fully understood.

—Professor Angeli, the celebrated portrait painter, who is the Queen's favourite artist, has just completed a portrait of Her Majesty. He says that during the sittings she had letters, newspapers, and state documents read aloud to her by Prince Beatrice, and that her mental and physical energy seemed to be marvellous. Her Majesty is, by-the-by, a very good sitter and an easy subject for the portrait painter. Professor Angeli has been commissioned by the Queen to paint the portraits of Mr. Cecil Rhodes and Lord Kitchener, as two of this most distinguished subjects.


