

# Aussie Ambassador Breaking New Ground

MELBOURNE (CP) — Fifty-year-old John Keith Waller will be breaking new ground this month when he takes up his new post as Australia's ambassador to the United States. He is the first career diplomat to be appointed to a job which by tradition always has gone to a senior Australian cabinet minister.

But the role of pathfinder is not new to Waller. In a long, eventful career in the Australian diplomatic service, he has had many tough trail-blazing assignments.

Waller is a shortish, slightly built man who dresses impeccably—often in striped pants and dark coat—and speaks with an accent that is perhaps more

English than Australian. He has been in the diplomatic corps since 1936.  
Melbourne-born and educated, he now is first assistant secretary in the Australian department of external affairs, specializing in Southeast Asian affairs.

He succeeded Sir Howard Beale, who returned to Australia recently after six years in Washington. The post was at that time held by Waller.

Under his guidance, Australia's relations with the United States have improved in a number of ways.

to Washington. He was there as first secretary to the Australian embassy in 1947.

Waller has been one of Australia's top-flight diplomats for many years.

He took a leading role in the delicate negotiations which followed the severance of diplomatic relations between Australia and Russia after the Petrov affair in 1954. Vladimir Petrov, a member of the Soviet embassy at Canberra, defected to Australia and alleged the Russian embassy had been used to cloak espionage activities. In the anxious days that followed, Waller took a leading part in negotiations to prevent the Australian legation being detained in Russia. In 1960, when diplomatic relations were resumed, Waller went to Moscow as Australia's ambassador.

He has served in many other countries, including China, Brazil, Britain, Thailand and the Philippines.

As a specialist in Asian affairs he has guided the diplomatic approach in recent months to the difficult problems confronting Australia in this area, particularly since the Malaysian crisis.

A fresh island fish dinner will be served at 1:15 p.m. to those wishing to stay through for the evening events. The ladies will start serving at 4:30 p.m.

The evening events include the Finals of the two Kensington-sponsored Island-wide competitions, the Barber Shop Quartet Singing and the Island Beard-Growing Championships. These will be followed by a Street Dance.

# Campobello Park Gets LBJ Okay

WASHINGTON (AP)—An international park on Campobello Island, once the summer home of the late president Franklin D. Roosevelt, will be established under a bill signed Wednesday by President Johnson. The bill actually provides for the creation, jointly with Canada, of a commission empowered to accept from the Hamner family of New York and California the summer home and 10 1/2 acres occupied by the Roosevelt family. The Canadian island is near the U.S. border. Canada and the United States will share the costs of the project. They are estimated at \$21,500 for rehabilitation and development; \$14,000 for acquisition of land for parking near the house, and \$27,000 for installation of central heating. Annual operating costs, to be shared by the governments, are estimated at \$25,000.
