Yankees And Dodgers

Washington coasted to an 11-3 victory over the Senators, paced by Tom Uhlert and Gerry Snyder, pasted four pitchers for 13 hits to extend their winning streak to six straight. Uhlert and Snyder banged out three hits apiece. The Philadelphia Athletics whacked Baltimore twice 9-4 and 6-4, bunching seven runs in the eighth inning of the first game and four runs in the seventh inning of the nightcap. The double defeat plummeted the last place Orioles three games below the seventh place A's. Don Larsen, Baltimore right-hander, retired the first 17 men he faced, but was the victim of Philadelphia's four-run rally in the seventh to lose his 13th game against two victories in the nightcap.

HOAK GETS TWO RUNS

Rookie third baseman Don Hoak scored both Brooklyn runs and relief pitcher Jim Hughes fanned Rip Repulski for the final out with the Dodgers leading in the ninth as the Dodgers made it two out of three over St. Louis. Hoak scored on Duke Snider's single in the fourth and on Gil Hodges' sacrifice fly in the eighth. Clem Labine was credited with the victory. He allowed six hits before leaving with two out and the bases full in the ninth. Harvey Haddix was charged with his seventh defeat. Andy Pafko drove in three runs with his 11th homer and a bases loaded single as the Braves swept a three-game series with the Giants. His single came in the seventh inning off Ruben Gomez, leaving a 2-1 lead. The Braves won the first two games, Dave Jolley was credited with his fifth victory in relief. Bob Talbot's single off Herman Wehmeier in the ninth inning scored Gene Baker with the run that gave the Chicago Cubs a 2-1 victory and a sweep of their doubleheader with the Philadelphia Phillies. The Cubs won the opener 6-1 as Ralph Kiner hit his 15th homer of the season. Cincinnati and Pittsburgh divided a doubleheader. The Redlegs won the second game 3-2 as pitcher Howie Judson helped win his own game with a run-scoring single. Frank Thomas collected a home run and three singles to lead the Pirates to a 4-2 first game victory.

Strickland Out With Broken Jaw

NEW YORK (AP) - George Strickland, 28-year-old shortstop of American League leading Cleveland Indians, may be lost to the club for about a month after suffering a double fracture of the jaw in Friday night's game against the New York Yankees. Strickland was hit by a ball thrown toward third base by Marlin Stuart, Yankee relief pitcher, as the tribe infield slid into the bag in the ninth inning.

One Killed, Six Injured In Blast

QUEBEC (CP) - A dynamite explosion that may have been caused by lightning has killed one man and injured six others at Labrieville, Que., it was learned here Sunday. The accident occurred July 14 in a tunnel, part of the underground system for the vast Hydro-Quebec power project on Bersimis river 250 miles northeast of Quebec, during a thunderstorm. Georges Michaud, 25, of Shawinigan Falls, Que., who is being treated here for eye injuries suffered in the explosion, said the men were just finishing installation of 30 pounds of dynamite prior to blasting a section of the tunnel when the explosion occurred. Michaud said lightning may have touched off the blast. He said the dead man was an immigrant, but was unable to give his name or nationality. The other five men were treated at Labrieville.

Mr. L. R. Wallace presided at a well attended meeting of the directors of the Alberton Prince County Exhibition Association held in the Exhibition building Friday night. The committee appointed to arrange for a water pressure system for the bestock barns and kitchen handed in their report and a later discussion they were advised to have the system installed for this year's two day fair. It was decided to build a fence near the buildings which would leave a large parking area outside the main grounds and relieve the congestion of traffic caused by selling tickets at the roadside. A program was drawn up for the judging during the two days. Most of the judging except cattle and horses will be done on Tuesday, Aug. 31st. General purpose carriage horses up to Sec. 7, Arabian, Guernsey, Shorthorn, dual purpose Shorthorn, sheep, poultry, vegetables, grains and roots will be judged on Tuesday and the remainder of the carriage horses, draft horses, Holstein, Red Poll, Hereford cattle, and hogs will be judged Wednesday. The secretary reported that all booths outside the building had been taken and meals in the kitchen are being provided by a local organization.
