

Local and Other Items.

HON. J. C. POPE is expected home in about a week.

SEVERAL of the badly-spelled street signs are being corrected.

THERE will be a meeting of the City Council this evening at 7.30.

THE mails from Cape Tormentine will arrive in the city this evening.

THE market to-day was not very well attended. Prices unchanged.

THERE was no business at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court to-day.

IT is hoped that the Local Legislature will rise on Thursday—just five weeks since the session opened.

ACKNOWLEDGED, with thanks, the sum of five dollars for the "Soup Kitchen" from Government House; also five dollars from a "friend" through Dr. Dodd.

A MAGIC LANTERN Entertainment will be given in the Reform Club Hall next Friday evening, under the auspices of the New Dominion Section S. T. Admission 10 cents.

A "TWIN" sail boat has been rigged and substantially decked by Mr. Henry Hales. It is capable of doubling the speed of any ordinary boat, and cannot be capsized by the severest gale of wind.

THREE fine fat oxen belonging to Hon. J. C. Pope were sold by auction at the Market Square to-day. They were purchased by Messrs. Blake Bros. for \$92, \$93 and \$122 each, respectively.

SEVERAL fine stallions belonging to Hon. J. C. Pope and other gentlemen were offered for sale at the Market Square to-day. The prices offered were not sufficiently large and they were "bid in."

A ST. PAUL despatch of the 27th ult. to the Western Associated Press says: "Mr. William B. O'Donoghue, the brains of the Riel insurrection, died at St. Joseph's Hospital in this city on yesterday afternoon."

THE Summerside Progress says that the shutters on the Court House are to be removed, and a high fence built around the front of her building. This speaks volumes for the architectural skill of the Commissioner of Public Works and his Engineer.

WE hear that the inhabitants of Cape Traverse and vicinity are soon to apply for a grant sufficient to sink several artesian wells in that locality. We hope they may succeed. They are certainly just as much entitled to such a boon as the people of Murray Harbor or Belfast.—S. P.

THE Chicago Inter-Ocean says that the wholesale houses there are doing a thriving business—better than for several years back. Another American paper says that the estimated influx of population into Kansas for the last month has been 2,000 a day; and that Nebraska is doing nearly as well.

THE schooner "Rustic" belonging to Messrs. Peake Bros. & Co. was hauled up on the slip at the head of No. 3 Wharf last Fall. She was extensively repaired, and is now almost a new vessel. On Monday evening a large crowd assembled to witness her being launched. At eight o'clock the last prop was struck, but she only slid about eight feet. She still remains on the slip, but will very likely get off this evening.

FORERUNNERS.—The flight of wild geese to the northward betokens the approach of spring; the voice of the turtle dove indicates balmy weather; the appearance of robins signifies that summer is coming; and the transit from Halifax to Moncton of large quantities of Government stores from the depository of choice wines, &c., betokeneth the near advent of the great and good Mr. Brydges. These signs have all recently appeared; wherefore the people may shout aloud for joy, for summer is on the way and Brydges is coming. And thus the Temperance Wave marches on!

AT half-past three o'clock this afternoon one of the Railway employees entered the oil magazine. While there a spark of fire was, by some means, communicated to inflammable matter, which immediately went into a blaze. In his attempt to extinguish it his clothes took fire, and, only for the timely assistance of some parties who were working near the place, he would have been very seriously injured. The fire was extinguished shortly afterwards by the Railway hand engine. After this the alarm was sounded from the City Bell Tower, and the different engines were moved in the streets. A large crowd gathered in front of the Silsby Engine House, and after being informed that the fire was extinguished before the alarm was given, they quietly went their way.

IS the New Brunswick Legislature on the 1st inst., Mr. Smith committed the bill to amend the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Railway Co. Act. The mover explained that the bill was to revive and continue the existing act for the construction of a railway to Cape Tormentine from some point on the Intercolonial Railway. He said it appeared that the Northern Light, which had been trying to carry the mails during the winter between Georgetown and Pictou, was a failure, and the work would have to be given up. He had reason to believe that during the coming summer the Dominion Government would build boats at Cape Tormentine to run either daily or tri-weekly in winter between Capes Tormentine and Traverse, and if the work could be done successfully, as he believed it would be done by well-manned boats, he had no doubt that the Dominion Government would aid the Company in the construction of the proposed road. The Bill was agreed to.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

THE SITUATION.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)
CONSTANTINOPLE, April 15.

The consequences of the spread of typhus fever to the city from the Russian camp are that departing vessels receive foul bills of health.

The projected visit of the Khedive to the Sultan is postponed.

It is stated that Count Zachy, Austrian Ambassador, has renewed proposals for the eventual occupation of Bosnia and Herzegovina; pointing out that unless the Porte agrees to this measure it will be impossible to bring about the return of Bosnian refugees, or re-establish the Bessarabian question at the Congress.

Russia is in accord with Austria in this matter, and would consent to modify the requisite portion of the San Stefano treaty if the Porte should consent to Count Zachy's proposal.

It is untrue that Count Zachy has also asked to occupy the Salonica Railway.

BERLIN, April 15.

The Roumanian agent here officially denies the report that Prince Gortschakoff requested the recall of the Roumanian agent at Vienna.

BELGRADE, April 15.

Prince Milan is expected to start for Nisch on Thursday, and will probably issue his proclamation.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 15.

The trial of Suleiman Pasha has commenced. His condemnation is regarded as extremely probable.
