

Dodgers Continue To Roll Maglie Wins For Giants

Neither rhabarbs, injuries nor the St. Louis Cardinals could stop the onrushing Brooklyn Dodgers Thursday. The Dodgers edged the cards 4-3 for their 18 victory in 20 starts a few hours after pitcher Don Newcombe had been suspended indefinitely for "insubordination."

Tom LaSorda, a Dodger rookie making his first start, cut loose with three wild pitches in the first inning and got himself spiked in the process but the Dodgers eventually recovered.

Manager Walter Alston produced the winning run without a hit in the eighth by some adroit maneuvering of pinch hitters, Duke Snider walked and advanced all the way to third on Roy Campanella's sacrifice.

Alston sent up Frank Kellert to bat for Sandy Amoros against the lefthanded Harvey Haddix. When manager Eddie Stanky replaced Haddix with Frank Smith, a righthander, Alston used Rube Walker, a lefthanded batter, instead of Kellert. Walker's sacrifice fly drove in Snider.

HIT 500 MARK

The New York Giants, lost in the rush of the Dodgers' early season flash, finally climbed to the 500 mark by downing the Chicago Cubs 6-3 in a game that was interrupted twice by thunder showers. Sal Maglie, beaten three times and making his first start since April 23, was the winner

with help from Marv Grissom in the last three innings. Maglie was replaced after the sixth inning when he lost his shut-out bid on Ransom Jackson's triple and Bob Speake's first major league homer. Ted Tappe hit a pinch homer for the Cubs and Foster Castleman homered for the Giants.

Pittsburgh's surprising Pirates won their fifth straight and handed Milwaukee its fifth straight defeat 9-4. Jus to rub it in, the Pirates pulled a triple play to save the victory for Nelson King after he had been replaced by Vernon Law in the seventh.

THREE DOUBLES

Dale Long, up for his "last chance" at the majors according to general manager Branch Rickey, drove in six runs and started the triple play. Long once a lefthanded catcher, had three doubles.

In the lone American League game, Al Kaline won another for Detroit 3-2, slugging a triple to right centre with two out in the ninth. The triple scored Fred Hatfield and broke up a pitching battle between Tom Brewer of the Boston Red Sox and rookie Duke Reed of the Tigers.

The victory left Detroit tied with Cleveland for the league lead at 13-7, as Bucky Harris' tigers closed a successful home stand in which they won 8 to 10 games.

Don Newcombe Is Given Indefinite Suspension

BROOKLYN (AP)—Big Don Newcombe, a 20-game winner for the Brooklyn Dodgers four years ago, drew an indefinite suspension Thursday after a run-in with manager Walter Alston, the most serious of the flare-ups that have marked Brooklyn's successful start of the National League season.

Newcombe, who hasn't pitched since April 24, refused to pitch in batting practice Thursday and demanded to be given a regular turn against the St. Louis Cardinals.

Angered by this refusal, Newcombe's second within a week, Alston told him to take off his uniform and go home. Vice president E. J. (Buzze) Bavasi made the suspension formal with a telegram which told the pitcher he could apply for reinstatement "when you are ready to comply with the orders of your manager."

Although at least three other Dodgers have sounded off this spring about Alston's actions, Bavasi denied that there was any discussion on the club. He called these "gripes" a "healthy situation" showing a desire to win.

The airmen overcame a terrific comeback by the B.Y.C. to win the seventh and deciding series game 16-14. The B.Y.C. went into last night's play-offs three games down, but tied the series and at one time were within a point of the championship before the final air force drive.

The game was played at the Y.M.C.A. and the fair-sized crowd of spectators were in a state of near frenzy as the two teams battled back and forth on rallies that sometimes lasted for several minutes.

Boxers Impressive In Final Drills; Record Crowd Expected At Fight

Smooth working Ray "Sugar-Boy" Watkins of New York City and cool, clever Cobey McCluskey of Charlottetown impressed ring observers last night with their final pre-fight workouts in preparation for tonight's ten round main bout at the Forum.

The rangy, hard hitting Watkins arrived in the City from New York by air yesterday evening and within forty-five minutes he was going through light drills. He tipped the scales at 158 pounds and appeared to be in excellent condition.

With him was manager Mike Capriano, a veteran boxing man who has watched most of the leading U.S.A. and Canadian boxers. He has seen McCluskey fight in New York and feels confident that his fighter can take the Charlottetown boy.

Watkins himself expects a furious fight. "Every time I go in the ring I go in there to win. I like a short fight and I hope to have McCluskey out of there early," he stated.

Watkins stands five feet eleven inches. He is the number one middleweight contender in the state of Maryland. In his last fight at Madison Square Garden he lost an eight round decision to Johnny Lombardo who recently lost a decision to Sugar Ray Robinson.

By trade he is a steel-worker. He is boxing his favorite sport in his spare time. McCluskey had ringsters talking as he went through his paces. He appears to be in the top condition of his career and by all appearances is headed for quite a successful summer.

He could quite possibly be called the coolest customer who ever entered a Charlottetown ring. Nothing worries him, least of all Watkins, who he respects as a fighter but of whom he has absolutely no fear.

There was a large crowd on hand last night and interest appears to be at a fever pitch. The advance ticket sale is quite good and promoter Ivan Doherty expects a record breaking crowd coming through the gates this evening and heading for the chairs around ringside.

Also working out yesterday evening was "Red" Graham of Halifax who fights Gaston Roy in the semi-finals. Graham is accompanied by Pres Donovan, a

former Island fighter who was very well known inside the squared circle.

Roy held his final workout yesterday afternoon. He boxed with Harry Poulton. He expects a tough fight from Graham but observers feel the colorful young College student can hold his own against the Halifax fighter.

Louis Lafferty and Austin Squarebriggs, who meet in a six-rounder, went through their paces last night and both are in very good condition. Bob Hession of

Winnipeg, a colored fighter who is fighting with the Navy at the Canadian Golden Gloves in Winnipeg, has challenged the winner. Plenty of fireworks are anticipated in the opener between Bobby Quinn and Netta Steele, two rugged and fast improving mitt-men.

The third man in the ring for the main bout will be Bernard Hughes. The judges will be Johnny Johnston, Montreal, Earl Smith, Summerside and Danny MacCormac, Charlottetown.
