Let's Talk It Over

Prince Edward Island's north shore, with its stretches of fine white sand, its thundering breakers, and its picturesque inlets, are pretty well known to our tourists, and the favorite localities for bathing and basking in the great out-doors are fairly well advertised.

The south fringe of this emerald crescent of ours is not so well known. Yet there are some beaches ideal for bathing and the scenery is no less beautiful at certain places along our south shore. Such places as Chelton, Augustine Cove and Victoria, to mention a few, have just about everything it takes to attract weary tourists who wish to forget their responsibilities and worries in quiet surroundings filled with the pastoral beauty for which our Island is famed.

When the thermometer registers in the high sixties or low seventies, common enough to our Island summers, the atmosphere of these south shore resorts is still friendly and warm. What a tourist heaven the little village of Victoria could be made into, to give one example.

With a comparatively simple damming operation, a beautiful lake would rise into being, quite close to a stretch of sandy beach.
