300 Seal Pelts Seized At Souris

SOURIS — Between 2,000 and 3,000 seal pelts have been seized as they were being loaded aboard a vessel at Souris earlier this week and are now impounded at one of the fish packing plants here.

The pelts are said to have been landed by the group of seal hunters operating with helicopters off the north shore of the province under the direction of Dr. Marc Arsenault Grindstone, Magdalen Islands.

Dr. Arsenault is said to have chartered the MV Colville Bay, owned by Percy O. Hanley, Souris, to transport the pelts to the Magdalen Islands.

The vessel is said to have been nearly loaded when the RCMP arrived on the scene and ordered the pelts removed and impounded at the Eastern Fish Packing Co. plant.

The pelts are said to have figured in claims and counter-claims by the Magdalen Island group of hunters and the captain of one of the sealing vessels which was also operating in the gulf ice fields.

Inspector A.S. McNeil, officer commanding the Island division of the RCMP, said last night that no charges have been laid in connection with the case as yet and that it had been referred to the Attorney-General's department.

Attorney-General Melvin McQuaid said last night at Souris that the case hadn't come to his attention officially yet, but he indicated he knew that the pelts had been impounded.

The legal aspects of the case which the captain of one of the sealing vessels calls "piracy" are being investigated by both provincial and federal departments and law-enforcement agencies.

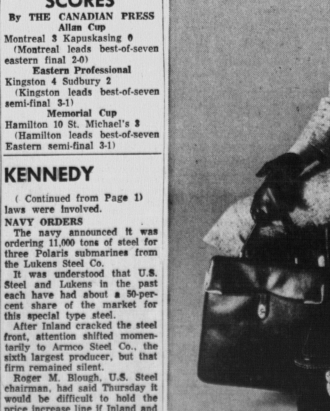

100 Students Attend Counselling Program

The first career counselling program for smaller offices of the Unemployment Insurance Commission in Canada was carried out yesterday at the Charlottetown office.

More than 100 grade 12 students from eight high schools counting in the province were present for the counselling in 16 different vocations. The project, designed to assist students from high schools this year in choosing a career, is under the direction of J.A. Murphy, supervisor of the branch and C.A. Orford, special placement officer.

A special counsellor for each career talked to the group on particular occupations. The counsellors answered questions on such matter as wages, working conditions, educational requirements, promotional opportunities, personal requirements, the best locations for opportunities and many others. The film "You Can Go A Long Way", in keeping with career counselling was also shown as a feature of the program.

S'ide Crackdown Nets 5 Speeders

SUMMERSIDE — A clampdown on speeders in the town resulted in five offenders appearing in police court yesterday before Judge W. E. Darby, with fines ranging from \$10 to \$25 plus costs.

Milton MacLean, Summerside, was fined \$25 and costs after pleading guilty to operating a motor vehicle at speeds of nearly 50 m.p.h. East Paugh, Mt. Pleasant, paid \$15 and costs for driving his car approximately 45 m.p.h. early Saturday morning, while Gilles Pratt of the RCMP station received a \$10 fine. He estimated his speed at approximately 35 m.p.h. although the police report said it was nearer to 45 m.p.h.

Abel Arsenault, Summerside, was fined \$25 and costs for speeding on Upper Central St. Thursday afternoon around 4:15 o'clock. Judge Darby informed the accused he would have fined him \$100 if the time had been one-half hour earlier when children were just leaving the various schools.

He honor said "we can't have people driving around the streets

at a fast rate of speed at that time of day when children are going home from school." He noted that it is a criminal offence to do such a thing and he should be charged under the Criminal Code, rather than the Highway Traffic Act.

Michael Bustreux, RCMP station, was levied a fine of \$25 and costs for speeding on Central Street, estimated by police officer Elmer Matheson at nearly 50 m.p.h.

One man pleaded guilty to an intoxication charge and was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.
