

# Red Wings, Canadiens Split Week-end Games In Finals

DETROIT, (CP) — Ken Mosdell, 31-year-old centre, broke up an overtime game Sunday night to give Montreal Canadiens a 1-0 victory over Detroit Red Wings and keep the Montrealers in the hunt for the Stanley Cup.

The goal, at 5:45 of the first overtime period, was Mosdell's first in the post-season playoffs and came at a time when the defending champion Canadiens faced elimination. The series now stands at 3-2 for Detroit with the sixth game scheduled for Montreal Tuesday night.

Mosdell wound up a solo rush with a low shot to the corner of the net that beat goalkeeper Terry Sawchuk.

It was the finishing touch to a thriller that had the sell-out crowd on its toes most of the way. Defeated 2-0 at Montreal Saturday night, coach Dick Irvin of Canadiens benched goalie Jacques Plante in favor of Gerry McNeil who hadn't seen action since Feb. 11 when he was injured. And McNeil was brilliant as he stopped labelled shots from Red Wings sharpshooters.

The game was a rugged grueling struggle with desperate, close checking by both sides and life-saving performances by both goalies. McNeil, Canadiens' former regular, never turned in a better effort.

The end came with startling suddenness. Big Moe started from his own end after a Detroit rush had been broken up and went straight down centre. He swung over to his left as he reached the Detroit defence, pulled up in front of defenceman Bob Goldham, made a complete turn and fired.

It was less than a foot off the ice when it swished past Sawchuk into the far corner.

In addition to the switch in goalies, coach Dick Irvin came up with more line shuffles. Gay Stewart, recalled from Buffalo when the playoffs started, got his first start Sunday night and he was a linemate, along with Lorne Davis, when Mosdell broke up the game.

A Detroit goal early in the second period was disallowed by referee Bill Chadwick who ruled that Glen Skov had kicked it into the net. McNeil had dropped to the ice on the close play and was up protesting as the referee signalled no goal.

A near-free-for-all broke out in the first period when several players squared off and there was much pushing and shoving. Four minor penalties for roughing were handed out, two to each side.

Late in the third period, Canadiens were given a penalty when caught with seven men on the ice during a change-over of lines, and the Red Wings turned on the heat. The penalty came only five minutes from the end of regular time and McNeil came up with a stop that saved his team when he flung himself into a shot by Johnny Wilson, who picked up Jimmy Peters' passout and drilled a bullet shot from 15 feet out.

The Wings started out in the overtime session as if they wanted to end it in a hurry. Howe raced in to blast a terrific shot after taking Alex Delvecchio's pass, and it was McNeil alone who saved Canadiens from defeat there. It was such a sensational save that the partisan Detroit crowd gave the little goalie a big hand.

Sawchuk followed with a top-notch save himself when Jean Beliveau snapped a hard shot from 25 feet out. The Wings drove in again and Butch Bouchard cleared a loose puck as the Red Wings swarmed about it. It was only a few seconds later that Mosdell got away on his game-winning effort.

The teams were about equally matched in shots—McNeil making 22 saves and Sawchuk 21.

**Saturday's Game**  
MONTREAL, (CP)—Johnny Wilson's second-period goal and a long lift by Red Kelly into the open net in the dying seconds of the game gave Detroit Red Wings a 2-0 victory over Montreal Canadiens Saturday night and a 3-1 clutch on the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final.

Detroit took the only two games played so far in Montreal and lost one of the two at home.

Wilson's goal at 2:09 of the middle period came with an unexpectedness that bewildered the crowd of 14,583. Both teams were shorthanded through penalties at the time.

On a faceoff in the Montreal end, the puck went to Wilson and the 24-year-old winger fired a backhand from about 25 feet out.

Goalie Jacques Plante reached for it with his hand but he missed the partly-screened shot and the puck went between his pads and into the net.

## Hogan And Snead Tied For First In Masters Tourney

AUGUSTA, Ga., (AP)—Ben Hogan and Sam Snead tied for first place in the masters golf tournament with a pair of ordinary performances Sunday as amateur Billy Joe Patton edged and lost on the final nine.

Hogan and Snead finished the 72 holes with totals of 289—highest winning figures in the tournament's history. Snead had an even par 72 for the final round and Hogan a 75.

They will play off for the title in an 18-hole duet today. Patton, the boyish-looking slugger from Morganton, N.C., who caught the fancy of the huge crowd at the masters, was tied with Hogan going into the last nine holes. But he gambled on his long wood shots on the two par five holes on the back nine, went into the creek twice and finished a stroke behind the leaders with 290.

Patton had an under-par 71 for his final round, getting a hole-in-one on the sixth hole to get back into contention after he seemingly had faded on the third round. Par for the 6,800-yard Augusta National course is 36-36-72.

He was the closest finish any amateur ever has made in the masters. Frank Stranahan tied Nelson for second place in 1947, but he was two strokes behind Jimmy Demaret's winning score.

## Joe Miceli Wins 5th Straight Victory

BOSTON, (AP)—Welterweight Joe Miceli of New York scored his fifth straight boxing victory Saturday night with a six-round technical knockout over Steve Marquello of Providence, R. I., in a nationally televised bout in Mechanics Building.

Miceli weighed 150 3-4 and Marquello 148 3-4, for the scheduled 10-rounder.

## Senators Take 2-0 Edge In Games

OTTAWA, (CP)—Ottawa Senators broke a 1-1 deadlock with a pair of third-period goals here Saturday night to shade Montreal Royals 3-1 in the second game of their Quebec Hockey League semifinals.

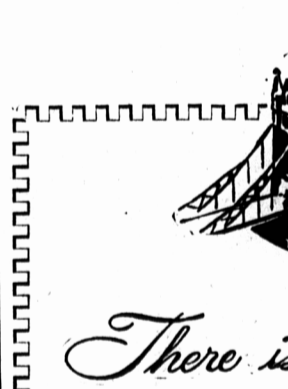
## Hoop Games Scheduled Tonight
