Terrible Fire in Milwaukee—Sixty Persons Perish.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. The New Haven House, Milwaukee, was consumed by fire at four o'clock yesterday morning. The fire originated in the lower part of the house, which is a building six stories high. The flames spread so rapidly to all parts of the first and second floors that a large number of the inmates were obliged to jump from the upper flats to the hard sidewalks. Many died instantly on striking the pavement, and the sidewalk shortly became strewn with dead bodies. Thirty persons are known to have perished, if not fatal, injuries. The New Haven House has long been known as a death trap. The insurance companies would not take risks on it. The adjoining buildings were greatly damaged by falling walls. The loss is estimated at half a million dollars.
