**ANOTHER CAUSE!**

The Guardian recommends Mr. J. H. Bell to the people of East Prince as a fit and proper person to represent them in the House of Commons,—because he is a prohibitionist. If the recommendation should be accepted the people of East Prince will have an additional cause for their annoyance on account of being deprived of the services of Mr. Yeo. Mr. Yeo is, a practical and experienced man of business, while Mr. Bell is a theorist and dreamer who speaks one way and acts another. By all means, let us, if possible, send temperance men to Parliament; but let us be quite sure that they are men,—and in other respects fit to hold a responsible and important representative position.

**LIGHT BREAKING IN.**

Two small sparks of independence appear in The Guardian of this morning. The Guardian is not able to congratulate the government upon its choice of Mr. John Scrimgeour as local distributor of the Fishery bounty money; and it says:

"A government may fairly be judged by the class of appointments it makes and this one does not enhance the esteem in which the appointing power is held."

Further The Guardian expresses the opinion that the straightening (?) of the curve at North Wilshire was very good as an "eye opener," and adds—

"But the cost of the work will serve as some excuse for the engineers who are responsible for the crookedness of the line as first laid down. P. E. Island is not an easy, but rather a hard country for railway building. While we have no very high elevations, there is little level country such as is found in the long valleys of the other provinces. Those who ride by rail on the Island must rest content to swing around a good many curves in time to come, however much they might prefer a more direct course."

So it appears, according to the Guardian, that all the abuse heaped upon the Conservatives on account of our "beautiful curves" was undeserved. What will the Patriot say now, poor thing?

**A CAUSE FOR WRATH**

THERE is something wrong about Mr. Pacaud. He is not satisfied. Perhaps Mr. Tarté's sons in Montreal receive the lion's share of the spoils. In a recent number of Le Soleil he reminds Sir Wilfrid that the Joly government gave him an office worth ten thousand dollars in a little over two years, but this "did not suffice to enable him to pay the obligations he had assumed for his party" and when he lost the office he was obliged to sell certain of his properties. Then he points out that when the lamented Mercier reached power he "gave proof of his great heart" by according to Mr. Pacaud's newspaper "all the government patronage, amounting to \$75,000 a year." The profits on this work Mr. Pacaud admits to have been "not less than \$15,000 a year"—how much more he does not say—but "nobody criticized this because it was well known that a large proportion of these profits were employed for party purposes." From these observations of Mr. Pacaud, we may infer, not only that this "leading Liberal" is in bad humor, but also that something more tangible than Liberal sentiment was used to put Mr. Laurier in power and to make the Liberals of Quebec "masters of the Administration." Mr. Pacaud seems to have made out a pretty clear case and he has, without doubt strong claims upon the party. If, then, the sons of Tarté have "scooped" the spoils of war which ought to have fallen to Mr. Pacaud, who will dare to say that Mr. Pacaud has not cause for his wrath.

**Boers Victorious.**

PRETORIA, November 17.—The Boer forces, after a heavy musketry and artillery bombardment, have stormed and captured the mountain stronghold of Chief Opein, of the Magatos tribe, in the Zoutansburg district. Opein recently massacred a missionary and his family, and the Transvaal government sent an expedition to punish the natives. The latter attacked the Boers, but were driven into the mountains. Two Boers were killed during the storming of the mountain stronghold.
