Exploring Mystery Of Migrant Birds' Flight

By DION HENDERSON. A WILDAUCKEE (AP)—How does a wild duck sleep his way from a marsh on the Mackenzie river to a slough in Louisiana, or from the Aleutians to Hawaii—and back again to the same spot? Since Aristotle observed — erroneously, though it took 2,000 years to find him out—that a chosen leader headed the migrant flocks, wise men and ordinary folk alike have speculated on what guides the world's millions of migratory birds.

NO ONE KNOWS

In other words, no one really knows. But now a distinguished water-fowl authority, summing up 15 years of observation by himself and other game management scientists, has come up with what may be an historical report. The migratory process seems so uncanny, says H. Albert Hochbaum, that most of the theories to explain it may have been over-complicated. The birds, he suggests, know their home the same way you know yours, and they travel in ancestral patterns using the same sort of system you would. This is the way that Hochbaum, director of research at the Delta waterfowl research station in Manitoba, phrases it.

A MILSTONE

And the statement may become a milestone in wildlife management. Hochbaum's report is contained in a book, "Travels and Traditions of Waterfowl" published by the University of Minnesota Press. It reviews the history of research on the subject and adds to it the findings of American and Canadian biologists co-operating in the Delta program. In the title of the book, Hochbaum adds a word to the outdoorsman's vocabulary — traditions. It covers and explains much of the behavior previously obscured by the "instinct" label.

This progress was accompanied by a slight average increase per service in attendance. Statistics showed there were six baptisms, four marriages, three burials, 26 services of Holy Communion, 47 Services of Morning and Evening Prayer and six other weekday services.

The Rector thanked each member of the congregation for his or her support and in particular the members and officers of the various organizations for their untiring efforts to care for the Missionary and Home affairs of the Church. Each Organization showed an increase in membership and accomplishment.

THREE YEAR PROGRAM. In looking forward to the future the Rector stressed the beginning of a three-year period of intensified Evangelism throughout the Canadian Church. This simply means telling the Truths of Christ to others and bringing them into the folds of the Church. It is hoped that a Parish Committee will be set up in the near future. The word needs Christ and it will receive Him upon the outward witness of those who possess Him.

Dealing briefly with the needs of the Diocesan Church—King's University—the meeting was made more interesting by the financial report conducted to increase the endowments of the College. The Rev. E. B. N. Cochran of Halifax is spearheading the drive and will be visiting the parish during the next two months. It will be conducted in a manner similar to the Anglican Advance.

Refreshments were then served by the ladies present.

The report also showed that though the installation of the electric lights was not completed until 1956 yet the bulk of the work was done in December 1955. The gift of a complete set of Altar Hangings from the Women's Auxiliary was acknowledged with sincere thanks by the congregation.

The Rector in his report stated that there was a small increase in the average congregation this year. This was a good sign and yet it could be made even better. The missionary giving was up still not what it should and could be.

A total of 56 services were held during the year, eight baptisms, 10 marriages, and one burial. The Rector thanked the Warden and Vestry and also the various organizations for their active support during the year. He was pleased to note that new children's groups were started in the Church and urged prayer for their continuance and success.

The two main emphasis for the coming year are the intensified effort for evangelism and the collection for the college. Campaign for funds. Both are necessary to our spiritual good and satisfaction and the other for the continuance of our Church, as King's is the College we depend on to train our clergy. In regard to the Canadian Church efforts to increase evangelistic efforts the Rector said we must let down the barriers of fear and self-consciousness and step forward for Christ and His Church. This calls for personal willingness to accept Christ, talk about Christ and bring others to Christ.
