

## Conservatives Sweep All 4 Island Seats

Progressive Conservatives yesterday swept all four Island seats in the House of Commons for the fourth time since 1957 — it was also the fourth time since Confederation — and veteran political observers here last night were freely predicting a provincial election would be called this fall.

Several of the more prominent Liberals in this area said that Premier Walter Shaw would be very foolish if he did not call an election now, following the clean sweep by the PCs in the federal field.

The PC candidates piled up early leads here as results started to come in. Only in Kings County where John Mullally, Liberal member in the last parliament was waging a reasonably close race with PC Melvin McQuaid for a time, was there ever any doubt of the outcome.

And even there the slim doubt was not long in dissolving. In all three ridings the PCs led from the time the first results came in.

Only the most optimistic Liberals in Queens voiced much hope that they could oust Angus MacLean or Heath Macquarrie, both of whom were strongly entrenched with solid majorities.

Mr. MacLean had a margin of 2,400 and Mr. Macquarrie 2,351 in the 1963 balloting.

The PCs widened that margin this time as Mr. MacLean their top man polled 12,560 votes for a margin of 3,062 over Mark MacGuigan, the highest Liberal. Mr. Macquarrie had 12,266 votes for a margin of 2,756 over Mr. MacGuigan. Liberal Mr. Jones polled 9,627 votes.

In Prince David MacDonald, a United Church minister in the Alberton charge, polled a margin of more than 900 votes over J. Watson MacNaught, minister of mines and technical surveys in the Pearson government. This reversed the margin of 580 votes which Mr. MacNaught polled in 1963 over his PC opponent Lorne Monksley of Summerside.

Commenting briefly last night, Mr. MacNaught attributed his defeat to older people voting for Old Age Security payments of \$100 per month, as promised in the PC election campaign.

Spot surveys made by independent observers indicated the young United Church minister, 29 would win in his first election. The main surprise was in the big margin of victory he achieved.

In no case were the New Democratic candidates a factor in deciding the issue.

Alex MacLean polled 636 votes, and Douglas MacFarlane 265 votes in Queens; Harvey G. Dawson polled 256 votes in Prince and Toby Mullin polled 99 votes in Kings.

Getting back to the suggestion that a provincial election will be called this fall, the old election act permits one to be called within 28 days of the issuing of the election writ. It means voting could be held by mid-December. A new election act calls for 46 days to elapse between the issuing of the writ and polling day, but this act has not been proclaimed. It is unlikely that it will be proclaimed.

## Excitement Builds Up

OTTAWA (CP) — Excitement built up Monday night at Conservative campaign headquarters here as Atlantic provinces results came in showing gains in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

"Yahoo!" whooped Eddy Goodman, PC campaign chairman.

Mr. Goodman was downcast at first as returns showed Liberals ahead in all seats in Newfoundland. But the news that Mines Minister MacNaught was running behind in P.E.I. sent a ripple of smiles through headquarters.

Meanwhile, this message was flashed by teletype to PC headquarters across the country: "We are leading in all four ridings in P.E.I."

## Imposter Beats Camp To Poll

TORONTO (CP) — When Dalton Camp turned up to vote in York Scarborough Monday he was told he had already cast his ballot. It turned out an imposter had been there earlier.

Mrs. Rosemary L. Clark, returning officer for the riding, said she was informed by two attendants at the polling station that a man arrived shortly after the polls opened saying he was Dalton Camp. He voted and left.

A little later, the real Dalton Camp — Progressive Conservative candidate in Toronto Eglington and national president of the Conservative Association — walked in.

He was told he would be unable to vote because his name had already been checked on the voters' list.

But a telephone call to Nelson Castonguay, chief returning officer at Ottawa, by Mrs. Clark assured Mr. Camp the right to register his vote. All he had to do was take an oath.

What about the imposter? His vote counts, too. There's no way of knowing which one was his.

Mr. Camp, a Toronto advertising executive, is a native of Woodstock, N.B.

## Conservative Party Strength Increased

Canadian voters Monday rejected Prime Minister Pearson's plea for a majority government by increasing Conservative strength although returning the Liberals as the largest party in the Commons.

This raised the possibility of another election in a year or 18 months.

Mr. Pearson said before the election that if the Liberals did not get a majority there would be another election in a year or a half.

He said he was not threatening the electorate but that new elections were inherent in a minority government situation. There have already been three minority governments since 1957.

SEES NDP HOOKUP  
At Windsor, Ont., External Affairs Minister Martin said the possibility of a Liberal coalition with the New Democratic Party "would have to be studied" if another minority government emerges.

NDP Leader T. C. Douglas, whose party increased its strength by at least four seats, said during the campaign that a minority government would be a good thing for the country. He pledged his party would support the largest Commons group if it adopted part of the NDP's platform in its proposed legislation.

Works Minister McElraith said in Ottawa that the Liberals "failed totally" to explain to voters the importance of a majority.

Mr. Pearson had made majority government the main theme of his election campaign. In some speeches he touched on little else.

The opposition reaction to Mr. Pearson's election call Sept. 7 was that a contest was unnecessary.

The voters apparently agreed with the opposition. With 35 seats undecided, 195 of the 265 seats were unchanged.

Both Defence Minister Heilley and Trade Minister Sharp said in Toronto that another minority government: appeared in the works.

All party leaders were returned. Mr. Pearson was re-elected in Algoma East, Opposition Leader Diefenbaker in Prince Albert, NDP Leader Douglas in Burnaby-Coquitlam, Creditiste Leader Real Caouette in Villeneuve and Social Credit Leader Robert Thompson in Red Deer.

LIBS STUNNED  
The Liberals were stunned soon after the counting started when they lost four seats in Nova Scotia, winning only one of 12 seats in the province.

They began to make some gains in Quebec and Ontario but the Conservatives, surprisingly, snatched a few seats from the Liberals in Quebec and a few more in Ontario. The NDP also picked up a few Liberal seats in Ontario.

The Liberals thus not only failed to gain the five seats they needed for a bare majority but saw their main opponent gain ground. The chance for a majority had faded by the time the Quebec and Ontario results were clear. They made no gain in the West.

Finance Minister Gordon, Liberal campaign chairman, said in Toronto: "I guess the people decided they were right and those who wanted a majority government were wrong."

Health Minister Judy LaMarsh said at Niagara Falls that she prayed another election wouldn't be called before Canada's centennial in 1967.

She said the voters "have again spoken with an unclear voice."

## Pickersgill Is First Elected

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Transport Minister Pickersgill was the first member of Prime Minister Pearson's cabinet to be declared elected in Monday's election. Mr. Pickersgill was elected for his sixth term in Bonaville-Twillingate.

## Hays Defeated By Conservative

CALGARY (CP) — Agriculture Minister Harry Hays was defeated by Conservative Ray Ballard in Calgary South. Mr. Hays Monday night did not concede but said he would await results of the service vote count.

## Pearson Says Disappointed

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Pearson said Monday night he is disappointed that his party did not receive a majority in the federal election and that Parliament now must carry on in the best interests of the country.

## Success Attributed To Fine Organization

David MacDonald, successful in his first try for a seat in the House of Commons, told The Guardian last night he attributed the major part of his success to the people in the "splendid organization" behind him and "the outstanding work" they had done in the campaign.

Asked if he was surprised, he observed that he would have to be just a bit surprised in his first election to defeat a member of the federal cabinet. But

reports coming into him in the last few days had indicated his backers were sure of victory. And the confidence was contagious, it was gathered from the young man of 29 years.

Asked what is immediately ahead, Mr. MacDonald said that two responsibilities stand out. He must tidy up the business of his campaign and he must make the necessary arrangements with his church which he will now have to leave to assume his new duties.

## American Airlines Jet Aircraft Crashes Into Hillside In Ohio

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP) — An American Airlines passenger jet with 62 persons aboard crashed into a hillside during a down-pour Monday night. Police said six were known to have survived.

The fate of the other 56 was not known.

One of the survivors was reported to be the captain of the plane, a Boeing 727.

American Airlines said the plane had a crew of six and 56 passengers, one of them an Auditorium, Summerside, with close to 1,000 PC supporters in attendance.

The plane crashed in a rural area near Constance, Ky., about 1 1/2 miles from the airport.

The medium-range jet had left New York's La Guardia field about two hours before the crash on a non-stop flight to Cincinnati.
