Senator Scott and the Government.

(St. John Sun.)

The report that Sir John A. Macdonald had offered a seat in the cabinet to Hon. Senator Scott lacks confirmation. The Premier might do a worse thing than to make the proposition, and the Senator could scarcely do a better thing than to entertain the suggestion if it should be made to him. It is known that Hon. Frank Smith is not desirous of remaining in the government. Mr. Scott has been regarded as the opposition leader in the Senate, but of late he has been one of the opposition members who do not fiercely oppose the policy of the government. As a member of the Mackenzie government he was characterized by industry and cautiousness. He was a minister under Mr. Blake when the latter was premier of Ontario, and secretary of state under Mackenzie when the latter was premier of Canada. He seems to have so far accepted the principles of these statesmen and maintained them that the present position of Edward Blake, the Rielite, is not satisfactory to him. The Sun does not know just where is the slightest ground for the rumor that the author of the Scott Act may become a minister again, but is willing that he should, although his doing so would deprive the country of the advantage of some sensible opposition criticism in the senate. It is sad to think of Senators Power and Alexander as leaders of the opposition in the upper house. And Senator Scott himself would immediately be accused of timber grabbing, land stealing, contracting, jobbing, corruption, murder, rape, and blasphemy.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

"Piousness" on Temperance.

Sir,—In your paper, which I am most happy to see you worthily devote to the discussion of all questions pertaining to the good of the community, permit me to offer a few remarks on a subject in which all are more or less interested.

The Temperance question is one which no moral or Christian man can shrink. It presses itself upon the attention of every man of integrity, for he is his brother's keeper. It is a question at the present time which should call forth the best powers, noblest gifts and strongest energies of every right-thinking and moralizing member of the community, for the noxious vice of intemperance is reigning in our midst, we might almost say, without let or hindrance. This is true of the Island generally, but especially of the city; and all, or nearly all, wink at it or act as if such a disgraceful and immoral state of affairs did not obtain among us. Now and again the force of bringing some old woman retailer, or effeminate man offender of the same kind to justice, is committed; but the wholesale vendor who does a thousand times as much injury to the country, because, I wend, he is a man of influence, is allowed to ply his nefarious calling unmolested. The trial, too, of these law-breakers, which is too often much more like a ludicrous play than of a legal process of stern justice—consisting, generally, of a series of postponements until the case is finally dismissed—bespeaks much. The ordinary hearer smiles as he listens, and as he listens he thinks—thinks if those who sit in judgment were put on the stand and the truth evoked, many a tale of thrilling interest would be told of law-breaking in high places.

Now, what avails any law if it remains a dead letter upon the statute book? The Scott Act, though defective as regards the machinery for its enforcement, if used in accordance with its utility and power for overthrowing this crying evil, would unquestionably remedy this lamentable and shameful state of affairs. It has done good service. For some three months, at one time, liquor could scarcely be obtained within the limits of the city. Why the change? During that time the Temperance Alliance, acting under the wise and energetic counsel of their worthy head, who has since passed away, were most vigorous in the discharge of their duty. The clergy of all denominations, hurled their thunderbolts without stint and without mercy, and all seemed to act as if the grand old cause of temperance demanded their noblest efforts—but why the change? Why the lethargy? Why the indifference? Why the nonsense in reference to temperance candidates, in the way it was undertaken? Surely not owing to politics, etc.

Monthly deliverances to the police, no matter how eloquent and powerful, will not avail, if they, both the magistrate and the police—be not God-fearing men and haters of unrighteousness. The ablest and the wisest legal enactments will be of no service unless put in operation. But if we want our land to be rid of this curse, everything nonsensical and hypocritical must be discarded, and things and deeds of candor substituted in lieu thereof. If we wish intemperance to be crushed out of existence, everyone of us must stand in the gap; everyone of us must do our duty.

Boston Markets.

BOSTON, June 30.
POTATOES—Choice old Potatoes are in light supply, and advanced to 65 and 75c. at the roads. Island Chenangoes from wharf, sold at 55 to 60c. New Potatoes were in liberal supply on Monday, with sales at \$2.50 to \$3.00 per bushel.

EGGS—The improvement in the Egg market is maintained, but there is no disposition to respond to much further advance at present. Eastern extras command 14c.; New York and Vermont 13c.; Canada and P. E. Island 13 to 13c.

CANNED GOODS—Lobsters are in fair demand and have been advanced to \$1.65 and \$1.70 per doz., duty paid. Mackerel are lower and selling at 55 to 60c.

FISH—There is no increased animation in the fish trade, and prices remain same as last quoted.
