Foundry Worker Painfully Burned

Raymond Durant, Summerside, was taken to the Prince County Hospital last evening at dusk suffering from severe burns on his right ankle when struck by molten metal while he was working at Bishop's Foundry on Water Street East in Summerside. Mr. Durant was engaged at work in the foundry where a staff of men were setting moulds to form castings when something happened to cause the molten metal to strike him on the lower part of the leg and ankle resulting in severe and painful burns. Members of the Summerside Fire Department were on hand at this time in answer to a fire alarm that had been sounded when someone had noticed flames shooting out of the foundry tube while the setting was in process. John McNeill, one of the firemen who happened to be in the foundry at the time of the accident, halted a passing motorist, and assisted Mr. Durant to the car where he was rushed to the Prince County Hospital for immediate medical treatment.
