The following are the results of the Law Examinations held by the Law Society of this Province in October 1st as given out yesterday: E. Victor MacMillan and George W. McPhee, City, pass as attorneys and barristers of the Supreme Court; Alfred Tanton, Summerside, passes as an attorney. These examinations were conducted by a committee, consisting of Premier Hazard, J. A. Mathieson, K. C., C. R. Smallwood and W. E. Bentley, who are appointed by the Law Society. A candidate making an average of 75 per cent of the aggregate number of marks obtainable upon the first intermediate and final examinations is entitled to be called to the bar at the same time as he is sworn in as an attorney; otherwise a year must elapse before he can become a barrister.
