Mr. Elmer Bernard was re-employed as police officer and general duties man for the Town of Kensington for the coming year at a salary of \$1,500. Mr. J. F. Proffitt was reappointed as Town Magistrate. It was noted by His Worship and the councillors that Magistrate Proffitt had filled this office for the past 35 years and that at all times his services to the Town of Kensington had been of a high order and that the people of the town owe a debt of gratitude to him for the manner in which he has carried out his duties so punctually and conscientiously.

Speakers Review W. I. Activities In Other Lands

Mrs. F. E. Davis, Leicestershire, England, and Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod, Lorne Valley, P. E. I., were guest speakers at the evening session of the thirty-eighth annual convention last evening of the P. E. I. W. I.

A member of the Organization Committee of the National Federation of W. I.'s, Mrs. Davis told the meeting there were over 7,500 W. I.'s, in England, made up of approximately a half a million members. The National Federation has members from England, Wales, Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and although Scotland has W. I.'s, there are no representatives in the National.

Speaking in a humorous vein, Mrs. Davis said she came to Canada in March to be a sort of sponge to sop up all the knowledge she could about Canada and its people.

"A country does not come alive," she said, "until the personal things are told through experience. It is the little experiences and problems that create the difference between countries."

She said that with all the hard surfaced roads in England it is easy for them to get about to meetings, and she thought this was not appreciated now that she had seen the handicaps of distances in Canada. Mrs. Davis continued to say the English women are encouraged to take a more active part in local government.
