### Discusses Transportation Of Perishable Commodities

Transportation of food products and perishable commodities was the subject of an address by Mr. E. A. Day, special representative of the department of research and development, Canadian National Railways, at the quarterly meeting of the P. E. I. Fisheries Federation at Souris on Saturday. Following are excerpts from Mr. Day's address:

"When Canada thinks of Prince Edward Island, it thinks mostly of the agricultural products the island produces, the quality of which is second to none.

"Although totally surrounded by the sea in a fertile area, it produces less of the products of the sea than any other province, and only recently has any real thought been given to the taking of other than lobsters—considered by those living inland as a luxury item—and attention has now been turned to the processing of ground fish and fish by-products.

"We of the Development Branch of Canadian National Railways have long suggested, in the interests of the development of the Province, that those things which the Province could produce best could be popularized under an advertised brand which would define their origin. We had in mind food specialties, such as some of those based on poultry, in which nobody anywhere can excel over P. E. I. I think I would look into fancy packs of things such as squab, tinged livers, etc.

"I would like to illustrate an exceptional line, examine what might be done with smoked turkey, with which Virginia, whose soil is in part somewhat similar to yours, has done so well. I would look into the Polish type ham and bacon lines that Saskatchewan has been featuring, aiming at a Prince Edward Island product that would become as famous as the Virginia hams and bacon; the same with fish and fish products that might feature the "St. Lawrence" brand, and to the latter must be added not only your lobster, so famously known, but also frozen fillets, for which you enjoy an enviable reputation outside of Canada.

"With fish particularly in mind today, we have to ask ourselves why does fish in central Canadian markets cost more than meat. The comparative cost of transportation when set against the cost of production, and compared with the selling price, is negligible.

"The ocean supplies fish for the catching. The fisherman gets from three to six cents per pound. Transportation is from one to five cents per pound, and while it takes years of feeding and care to develop animals for food purposes, a pound of beef or pork in the inland retail market is cheaper than fish for the shopper.

"Spoilage may be one of the causes of the high cost of fish, although it is difficult to convince the housewife that there should be such a difference in price from the fishing boat to the open market."

## Reports New Drug Tried To Treat Arthritis

TORONTO (CP)—A Montreal doctor said Saturday a drug called "Arthritis" has produced improvement in sufferers of arthritis of the joints.

Dr. Louis G. Johnson, head of the arthritis clinic at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, said that of 25 clinical patients treated with cortisone, 18 showed improvement. Two patients showed excellent response, in 10 the response was good, in six fair and seven patients showed no change.

Dr. Johnson made his announcement at the annual meeting of the Canadian Rheumatism Association. He is the association's past president.

He said the preparation is applicable to painful joints. Repeated applications of the solution caused no ill effects.

About half of the 25 patients obtained increased movement in the affected joints. The joints of the other half did not respond. The swollen area was removed in one patient, reduced in seven and showed no change in 17.

## Prospects Good For Record Baby Crop

OTTAWA (CP)—Prospects are bright for a record baby crop this year, providing a vast new army of consumers for Canadian businesses.

The youngsters are coming on the market at a high pace and statisticians predict that if current trends continue, Canada will produce a peak 448,000 babies in 1955.

# Royal Couple Completes 3-Day Visit To Norway

OSLO (Reuters)—Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh boarded the royal yacht Britannia Sunday night amid the thunder of acient cannon and the roar of jet fighters at the end of their triumphant three-day state visit to Norway.

The Norwegian language—normally lasts five hours, but Saturday night's performance was cut by half.

Sunday the Queen and the duke attended the morning service in the English Church of St. Edmund, Prince Philip read one of the letters, and the other was read by Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan—who flew from the San Francisco United Nations meeting to be here during the royal visit.

At 9:40 p.m., when the last of the Queen's dinner guests had left the ship, the festive bunting was taken in from the mastheads and the Britannia moved off on its homeward voyage.

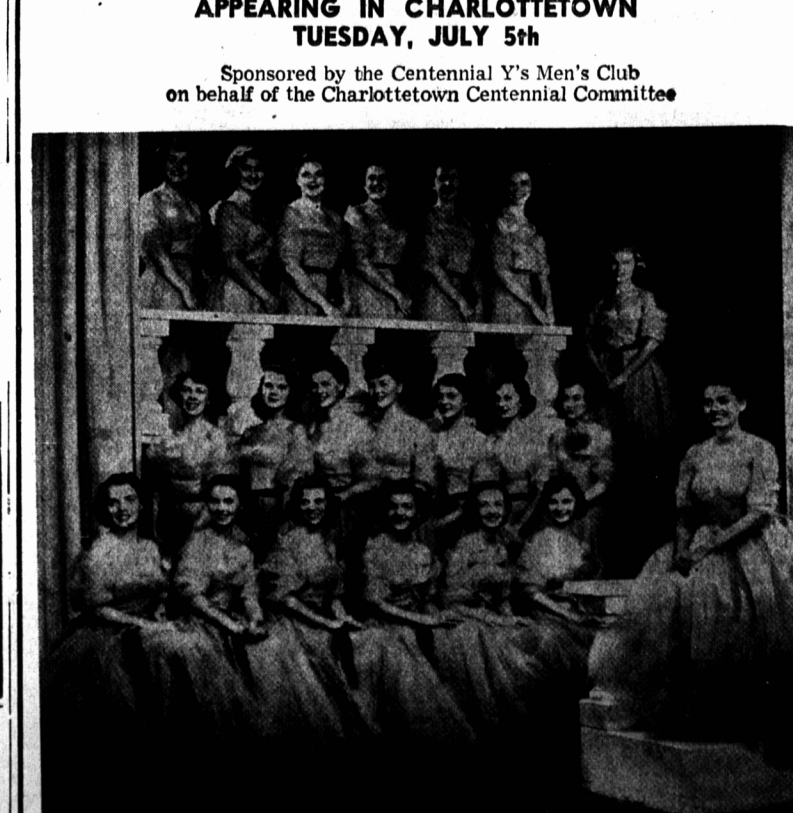
