OTTAWA (CP)—Finance Minister Harris, stating that the long-run future of Canadian magazines "appears to be in jeopardy" from foreign periodicals, announced Tuesday night a 20-per cent tax will be levied next Jan. 1 on gross advertising revenues of Canadian editions of foreign periodicals containing some Canadian advertising.

The special excise tax, announced in the minister's budget speech, will apply to foreign magazines sold in Canada with the same advertising and editorial content as in their home countries.

It will be imposed, however, on what Mr. Harris described as "a few cases" where a foreign magazine publisher issues a special edition for Canada differing from its home edition through inclusion of some reading material for Canada and sale of some pages—"often a great many pages"—to Canadian advertisers.

It is understood these regulations will apply to the Canadian editions of Time and Reader's Digest—two mass-circulation United States magazines—and a number of other American publications. These include Better Living, Everywoman's, Family Circle, Parents' Magazine and Woman's Day.

Officials said regulations will be framed later to outline the circumstances in which the tax will apply. There probably will be no problem since most publishers state separate advertising rates for Canadian and other editions. The tax in these cases would apply on the amount paid for the advertising in the Canadian edition.

P.E.I. Hotel Shows Profit

C.N.R. Planning Heavy '56 Capital Expenditure

OTTAWA (CP)—The CNR plans to spend \$233,564,000 on capital projects in 1956, the publicly-owned company told the Commons railway committee Thursday.

Its capital budget, approved by the committee, includes expenditures on road property, rolling stock, hotels and construction of branch lines.

The company will seek authorization from Parliament to spend \$15,011,000, of which an estimated \$181,447,000 would be spent next year.

The 1956 estimate of \$233,564,000 was not broken down, but the overall total was split this way: Road property including track, bridges and the like, \$168,175,000; construction of branch line projects already under way, \$28,028,000; rolling stock, \$183,770,000; hotels, \$20,608,000, mainly on Montreal's new Queen Elizabeth; investment in affiliated companies, \$14,430,000.

President Donald Gordon submitted the statement to the committee, which subsequently approved the capital and operating budgets of the company for 1956 and its annual report for 1955.

The 1956 operating budget, previously announced, calls for a small surplus of \$2,900,000 compared with one of \$10,717,000 last year.

Mr. Gordon's capital budget showed these proposed 1956 expenditures on company property by regions in Canada: Atlantic, \$13,198,000; Newfoundland, \$4,398,000; Central (Ontario-

Quebec), \$8,216,000; Western, \$37,821,000.

About \$10,000,000 would be spent on property for U.S. lines. The company's program for new rolling stock, to be spread over a year or more, calls for 424 diesel locomotives, 53 passenger cars, 10,265 freight cars and 603 units of work equipment rolling stock.

Most of the company's appropriation for hotels would be spent on the big building in Montreal—\$19,946,000.
