1,000 Illegally Placed Lobster Traps Destroyed In Prince County Areas

Lobster poaching in the Prince County areas, especially in the Alberton Harbour section, was struck a serious blow by the Federal Department of Fisheries recently when poachers had approximately 1,000 illegally placed traps destroyed. Out on regular duty as she has been for the past seven years was the Department's patrol boat, Cignus, which carries two smaller craft on board. One of them, a speed boat capable of doing 20 miles per hour, was extensively used in the drive against poaching. The other craft is a dinghy, in addition, for shoal water work. Patrol boats are in operation in inland waters. They carry a crew of two men each. The recent drive has caused serious loss to the poachers who have seen equipment in the way of traps and ropes to the value of \$3,000 completely destroyed by officials. Total de-

struction of the equipment is the only possible answer to the poaching threat. Though matters in the area are apparently quiet just now the Department of Fisheries is determined to stamp out the poaching practice entirely. Last night Mr. J. J. Larabee stated that patrols in the section will be continued, "and if necessary we will add more patrol boats if we have to bring them here from other places." He said the Department took a serious view of the condition which had obtained. Earlier this summer officials had expressed the opinion that poaching in Prince County was not as serious as it had been in past years, but increased activity by the poachers has caused the Department to step up its own counter measures. It is felt that the matter is well in hand at present and Department officials are satisfied that they are now 'getting ahead' of the poachers.

Largest Group Since War Graduates At S'side Air Navigation School

The largest group of flight cadets to receive their wings since the war were graduated from the R.C.A.F. Air Navigation School at Summerside yesterday afternoon. These young men, representing a cross section of Canada, received their coveted wings of the R.C.A.F. navigator from Air Commodore G. Bryans, C. B. E., C.D., deputy air member for air plans at air force headquarters, who was reviewing officer at the impressive wings parade.

Present at the ceremony were His Honor Lieutenant-Governor T. W. L. Prowse and Mrs. Prowse; Premier J. Walter Jones and Mrs. Jones; His Worship, Mayor Henry Wedge and Mrs. J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries and the Hon. Mr. MacNaught.

This wings presentation was memorable because among the graduates was the first course of the university summer students to be graduated by the R. C. A. F. as navigators. These summer air training cadets have attended the Air Navigation School for the past three summers. Now they will be posted to squadrons to give them some operational experience before they return for their final year at college. On completion of their college course they will join the R.C.A.F. reserve or regular force whichever they choose.

Official Opening Of S'side Legion Home

The new home of the Summerside Canadian Legion Branch was officially opened last evening by His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor T. W. L. Prowse at a simple but well arranged and well carried out ceremony last evening. His Honor, who was accompanied by his aide, Lt. Col. A. W. Rogers, said that the greatest honor he had received, since his appointment as Lieutenant-Governor was when he was invited to the Charlotteville Legion Branch and made an honorary member. He said that he was never so happy or so proud as when he was presented his honorary membership and he would never resign the Legion anything in his power to do.

His Honor said: "It is indeed a pleasure for me to be present at the opening of your new Legion home in Summerside tonight. This beautifully appointed headquarters in which we are now gathered represents the work and endeavor of a group of veterans in Summerside who have, in the true spirit of 'The Canadian Legion, put service before self.' New Designation For S'side Air Navigation School

It was learned yesterday that with the opening of No. 3 Air Navigation School at Winnipeg, Man., recently a change has become effective at the Air Navigation School at Summerside. Actually the change is really only in designation because the actual organization of the school remains the same.

From now on it will be divided into No. 1 Air Navigation School and the Central Navigation School. No. 1 A.N.S. at Summerside, as well as No. 2 at Winnipeg, will teach basic navigation. That is recruits will be brought in there and given the course which will lead to their navigators' wings and their commission. The Central Navigation School here will have the specialist courses and the test and development branch. The specialist courses comprise the instruction courses in navigation for navigators and pilots and the specialist navigation course which is held every year and which gains much publicity due to its long distance flights.

The Central Navigation School will set the standards which will apply at both the No. 1 A.N.S. in Summerside and the No. 2 A.N.S. in Winnipeg. Consequently although a navigation school has been opened at Winnipeg, the main center of navigation training remains here.
