GEORGETOWN — A decision for permission from the town council to clear up a site on the west side of Georgetown and the adjacent beach area in preparations for a park site was agreed upon at the regular meeting of the Georgetown Lions Club, held in St. James Hall recently.

Street Work Discussions Occupy Town Council Meet

GEORGETOWN — A recent meeting of the Georgetown Town Council, adjourned from the regular monthly meeting, dealt with a variety of matters pertaining to town affairs and adjourned to meet again tonight.

The mayor reported on conversations he had with officials of the provincial departments of public works and highways relating to future street work in the town. A considerable amount of work appears necessary on West Street, to place the travelled portion in the centre of the area between the property lines. This street will have to have the northern portion of it straightened out and this will necessitate the moving of a large quantity of materials that were piled on the area some years ago, when the northern portion of the street was diverted in another direction to join Monture Avenue.

The clerk reported receiving the town's 60 per cent refund for the stabilizing and placing of a culvert on a portion of East Water Street that was paved last fall.

It was decided to place advertisements in local and Maritime papers for a town policeman, the applications to close on June 12.

WANTS MARINES FAST
Brig.-Gen. Nguyen Chanh Thi, commander of the South Vietnamese 1st Corps, said Sunday night he has requested one U.S. marine battalion for immediate combat use around Quang Ngai.

He had not yet received a reply to his request.

Gen. Thi said in addition to American marines, he has requested two battalions of South Vietnamese airborne troops to check the perilous situation developing around Ba Gia.

Dr. Francis Joseph O'Keefe Dies Following Heart Seizure

The death of Dr. Francis Joseph O'Keefe of McAdam, N.B., and formerly of Gowan Brae, P.E.I., occurred at his home Tuesday following heart seizure.

A well known New Brunswick physician and surgeon, he was the son of Mrs. Sarah (White) O'Keefe and the late Michael O'Keefe of Gowan Brae.

Mr. O'Keefe received his early education at Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University following which he was principal for nine years at Stella Maris School, North Rustico. He later studied medicine at Dalhousie University and upon receiving his degree he practiced medicine at Fredericton Junction in 1951, the following year he established a practise in McAdam.

In 1962 he was appointed to the provincial health department in Fredericton returning to McAdam a year later.

He was a member of St. Clements Roman Catholic Church and president of Holy Name Society.

He is survived by his wife the former Marjorie Mitchell of Charlottetown and two daughters, Mary and Frances, one son, John, all of N.B.

Also surviving are his mother, four brothers, John, Bear River; Aden, Gowan Brae; James and Joseph of Toronto;
