ON Thursday night last the dwelling house of Mr. Malcolm McLean, at South Wiltshire, was totally consumed by fire. Mr. McLean and the other occupants of the house had barely time to escape. Neither furniture nor clothing was saved.

A considerable display of oratory was indulged in at the opening of the Nova Scotia Exhibition this week, the Mayor of Halifax, Lieutenant Governor Archibald and Mr. Premier Holmes being the speakers. The Governor's speech was the most elaborate.

THE Rev. Father Queviellon celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood, at Pittsburgh, Mass., last week. On that occasion a grand reception was held in the Academy of Music, at which all the Catholic Societies and Church members attended. The venerable father was presented with many valuable gifts. Father Queviellon is now seventy-four years of age. He was eight years a Priest of the Diocese of Prince Edward Island.

THE London correspondent of a Liverpool paper says that Turkey has contracted with the Providence Arms Company, of Rhode Island, for 600,000 rifles at \$17.05, apiece, and 300,000,000 caps. The total value of the contract is put at \$19,500,000. The terms of payment are not stated, but urgent delivery is called for.

QUEEN'S COUNTY EXHIBITION NOTES.—Extensive preparations are being made both at the Cattle Show Field and the Exhibition Building for the Queen's County Exhibition which takes place on Tuesday and Wednesday next. The number of entries in live stock is unusually large for a County Fair, and the display at the Drill Shed promises to be very fine. The small admission fee of ten cents will enable all who take an interest in the prosperity of the country to visit the Cattle Show and Exhibition.

THE Judges of roots and vegetables at the King's County Exhibition were skillfully deceived by an exhibitor who took first prize for best dozen onions. These onions were large, no doubt. The smallest would weigh 1 1/2 lbs. They were the admiration of all; and King's County—taking those for a sample—was the best onion growing County in the Dominion. The prize for best onions was, without hesitation, awarded; and as Mr. A. received his prize money he laughed in his sleeve at the thought of exhibiting Portuguese onions for those grown in P. E. Island.

COUNT SCHOUVALOFF will quit the Russian embassy in London at the end of the present month.

A map of the locality, together with plans and specification of the works to be done, can be seen at this office and at the Resident Engineer's office, at St. Anne, on and after SATURDAY, the 27th DAY OF SEPTEMBER next, at either of which places printed forms of tender can be obtained.

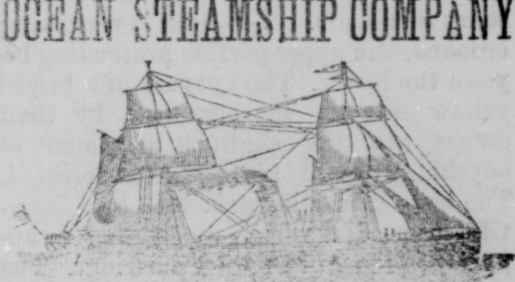
