Mrs. Catherine Morrow, Souris, visited with her parents, Rev. H. R. and Mrs. Bell, Red Point, recently.

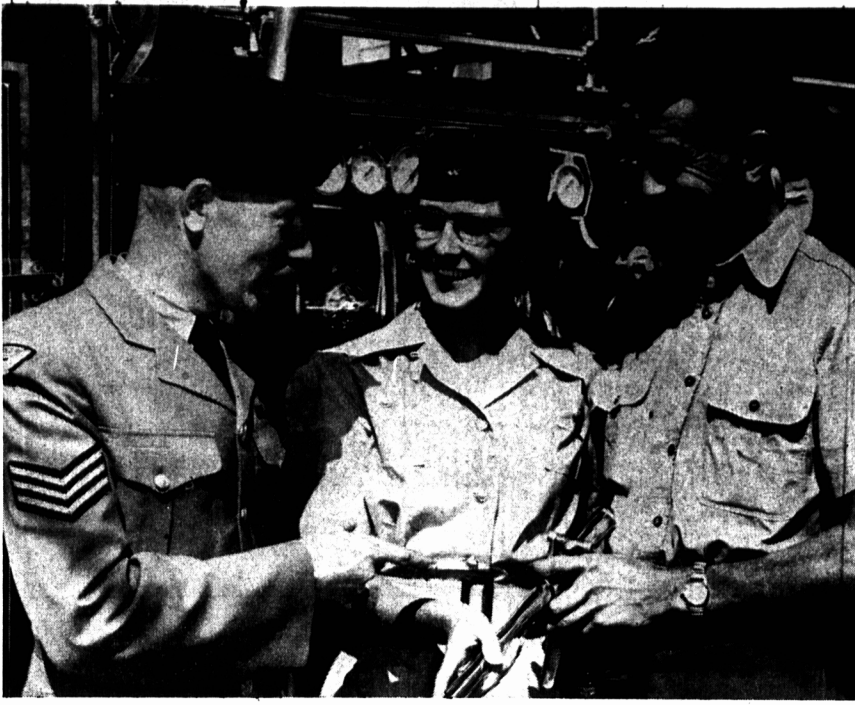

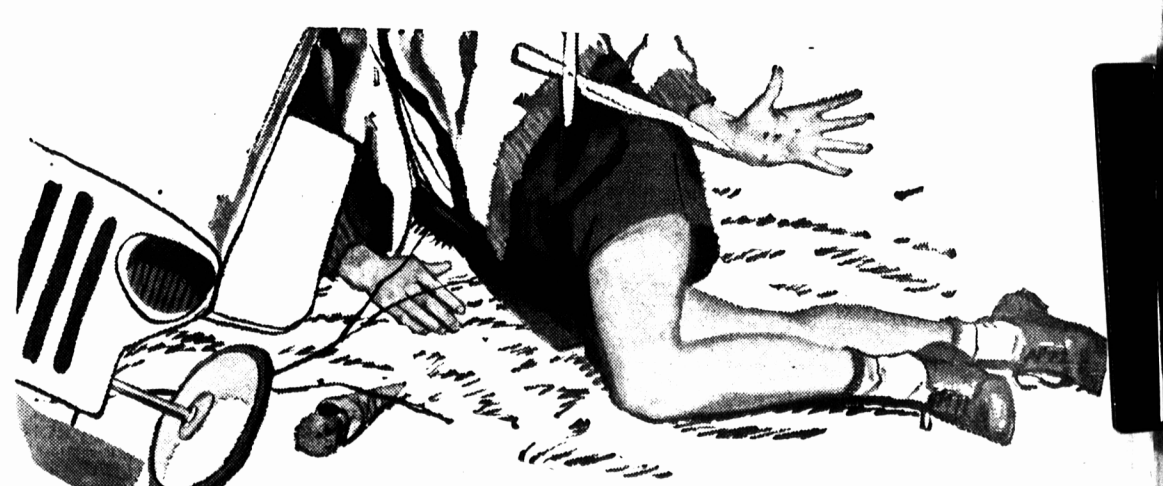

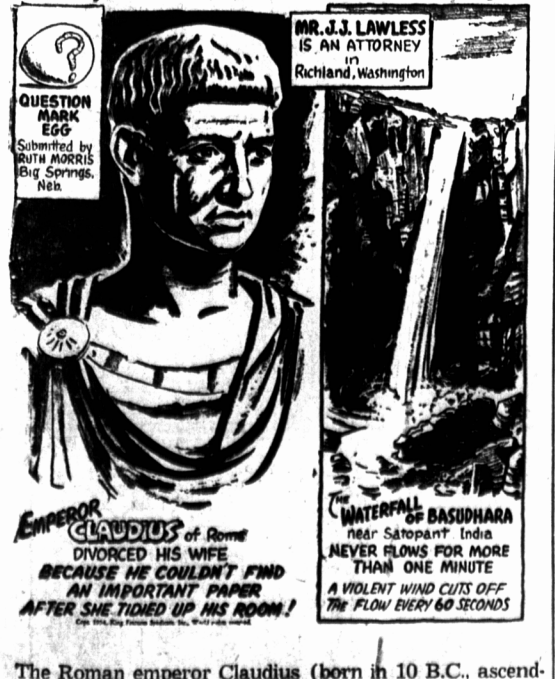
