Clues To Causes Various Cancers

PARIS, July 23—(AP)—A look at the world gives a series of clues to the causes of many types of human cancers, and how to avoid them.

These apparent causes lie in how you live, and where.

Scientists from nearly 50 countries compared notes last week at the fifth International Cancer Research Congress.

Three United States reports said cigarette smoking is apparently partly responsible for the rise in cancer of the lung.

Their evidence is "too conclusive to be ignored," said Dr. Charles S. Cameron, medical and scientific director of the American Cancer Society, in summing up the Congress. He went on:

Cancer of the hard palate often occurs among East Indians who smoke by putting the burning end of the Chutta leaf in their mouths. Chewing betel nuts causes mouth cancer in Malaya, Indonesia and some parts of the Philippines.

Too little iodine in water and food causes goitre and probably many thyroid cancers in the Great Lakes region, Switzerland and other areas.

Breast cancer seems lower in women in Japan and other countries whose custom is to nurse their babies. Women who have never borne children are far less likely to get cancer of the cervix.

Cancer of the genitals is not common among Jewish men and women, probably due to early circumcision of the males.

Cowboys in North and South America, Cossacks, Arabs and other nomads rarely get cancer of the prostate gland. This might be due to some hormone influence, for "riding frequently reduces the size and endocrine (hormone) functions of the testes."

Light-skinned people constantly exposed to the sun often get skin cancer.

A cancer meeting in Oxford, England, July 23-Aug. 4 will probe why geography so often turns up wide and startling differences in the amount and type of human cancers.

It is because excess weight, excess fat, requires more work on the part of the heart and blood vessels that insurance companies decline to accept greatly overweight as risks. In some cases the insurance companies accept overweight as risks but charge a premium equal to that charged individuals some years older. So sure are the companies of their statistics on overweight and heart and blood vessel diseases, that if the candidate for insurance will reduce his weight to, or nearly to, normal, and keep it reduced, they will accept him for insurance at the regular rate for his age.

Therefore, where early breathlessness appears and the individual is overweight with perhaps some swelling of feet and ankles, the first step should be to reduce weight by cutting down by 25 per cent on all starch and fat foods and also on all liquids.

Ask For Drastic Defence Measures

LONDON July 24—(CP)—Two top Conservatives this week pressed the government to step up Britain's defence tempo.

Harold Macmillan, a member of the opposition party's "shadow cabinet," proposed re-establishment of the wartime machinery of the joint Anglo-American chiefs of staff. He said Saturday that France should be added to this revived organization. Anthony Eden, deputy opposition leader, urged stronger defences because of the possibility of a third world war.

"I am absolutely convinced that negotiations from strength is the surest way to peace," Eden said in a speech Saturday at Colchester, Essex.

Aneurin Bevan, Health Minister who is regarded as belonging to the left-wing group of the Labor party, appealed to Prime Minister Stalin to halt the Korean war.

Business Spotlight

(By Forbes Rhude, Canadian Press Business Editor)

Wall Street Journal carries a bit of advice worth considering. It says: "Don't watch the old rat holes."

It is warning against running here and there, trying to protect yourself in the future by guarding against exactly the same things that happened in the past. It says in part:

A handful of people have rushed out to buy automobile tires. They were scarce in the last war. Remember? Some housewives have hurried to the grocery to lay in a supply of sugar. Recall the rationing? And a few women, we're told, have been buying up some extra nylons.

There has been a rush by some people to put in orders for new automobiles. Yet if passenger car production were cut back 25 per cent from today's level we could still have 6,000,000 new ones a year, second only to this year's prospective output record.

To sugar growers in Cuba and Puerto Rico it must seem amusing; they're trying to dig out from under surpluses. Tire makers already are saying: "Don't get excited; look at all the synthetic we can produce."

What must be remembered is that our economic machine has undergone some evolutions in the past decade. In 1942 we were very short of tankers to carry oil but now there's a surplus of them. Steel capacity is more than a fifth larger than 10 years ago. Thousands of miles of pipelines have been built to improve internal transportation. And for a decade almost every kind of industry has been adding to its plant capacity.

Meantime, those people trying to assess the economic affects might try this: Don't watch only the old rat holes. You're more likely to find him coming out of a new one.
