**A CITY OF NEWSPAPERS.**

Paris is said to Have Over Twenty-  
Five Hundred Journals

Paris publishes a new newspaper at  
every fresh sensation. The population of  
the city of Paris at the last census was  
2,500,000, and accordingly to the recently  
published "Presse Annuaire" for 1893  
the newspapers of the city now number  
2587.

There are in Paris at present 140 daily  
political newspapers, but how many there  
will be next week or how many the week  
after it is practically impossible to state.  
If public opinion demanded there might  
be another dozen. Of the public  
organs in existence 97 come under the  
category of Republican, 30 are Conserva-  
tive, and 13 are Socialist.

The maintenance of so many Social-  
ist newspapers in one city is strongly in-  
dicative of the extent to which French  
papers take up and consider politics.

The price of French newspapers is  
high, and the reading matter is small in  
amount. French newspaper readers do  
not require much news and are perfectly  
satisfied to depend upon the postoffice as  
an ordinary channel of communication  
whenever the telegraph fails.

More importance is attached to literary  
style than exact detail in local news-  
gathering, and it is therefore possible to  
publish with entire pecuniary success a  
Paris newspaper from the columns of  
which all items of expensive news are  
omitted.

**OUR QUEEN THEIR FRIEND.**

Speech of the New United States  
Ambassador to Britain.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—A farewell dinner  
was given at the Union League Club to  
Joseph H. Choate, the newly appointed  
ambassador to England. Mr. Choate, in  
the course of his speech, said:—"I be-  
lieve from what I have read or heard that  
the English people have never in the  
least been hostile to the people of America.  
(Cheers.) God has made of one blood  
these two mighty nations. Of common  
origin, of common language, of common  
literature; the English Bible and the com-  
mon law have bound the hearts of these  
two nations together in such a union that  
no rivalry of interests, no exigencies of  
politics on either side, have ever perma-  
nently impaired it. And one thing more I  
want to say, which I believe from the bot-  
tom of my heart to be absolutely the truth,  
and that is, that in that august and  
venerable woman who after more than  
sixty years of sovereignty still reigns  
supreme in the hearts of her people,  
Americans from the beginning have found  
a steadfast and faithful friend. (Cheers.)  
"Now, it is true that this vast and ear-  
nest friendship, which has found, and is  
finding every day, such abundant expres-  
sion on both sides of the Atlantic, is not  
going to change the course of human  
events or human nature. It will not  
make water run up hill, after all. We  
shall have our rival in crests still. It can-  
not but be that rivalry will be frequent  
and possibly sometimes bitter, but this we  
do not believe—from these well springs  
of friendship which have flown so copiously  
of late we shall contend as friendly  
rivals, and that all our difficulties here-  
after will be settled by peaceful negotia-  
tions and friendly arbitrations, and never  
again, I trust, by resort to arms."  
(Cheers.)

—A bill has been reported to Congress  
for the expenditure of \$42,000,000 to con-  
struct three 13,500-ton battleships, three  
12,900-ton armored cruisers and six 3,500-  
ton protected cruisers, a total of 12 vessels  
and 91,500 tons. With these vessels, the  
United States will move up to fourth place  
in the world's list. It is sixth at present,  
the order being Great Britain, France,  
Russia, Germany, Italy the United States,  
Japan.

The growing habit of discarding morn-  
ing at the earliest possible date consistent  
with the smallest amount of decency is  
certainly not to be laid to the account of our  
Royal Family. The mourning at Sand-  
ringham for the Queen of Denmark is as  
deep as it is true. The Princess, says a  
writer in the Gentlewoman, wears a long  
black gown of some lustreless material  
such as a fine cloth or cashmere, with  
crape of width seldom seen to-day, un-  
relieved from its sombreness by any touch  
of white from throat to hem, while from  
her head-dress streams a long black veil.  
Since her mother's death there have been  
no house parties at Sandringham, and  
very few guests, indeed only those who  
have come on State or otherwise im-  
portant affairs.

**A GOLD HUNTER'S DEATH.**

Killed by a Yukon Bear After a Brave  
Struggle.

SEATTLE, Wash, Feb 24.—F. H. Brown-  
ing, of Seattle, who has returned from  
Dawson over the ice, brings news of the  
terrible death of Carl Joel, of New York,  
who was killed by a Yukon bear on the  
banks of the Indian River. These bears  
resemble a cinnamon, but are larger. Joel  
was tramping up the trail with a heavy  
pack, when he suddenly came face to face  
with a big Yukon bear, which started for  
the miner as soon as he saw him. Joel  
was armed with a heavy 44  
Colt revolver, and every  
chamber was loaded. He started to fire.  
The bear when it was twenty feet away  
His aim was steady, and when he pulled  
the trigger a bullet struck home. Joel  
spouted from a severed artery, and he  
wrote out the story of the fight in crimson  
on the snow. The bear kept on, and the  
miner fired again. Another spurt of blood  
showed that the second bullet went home.  
No vital spot had been struck, and with  
the huge beast lumbering down upon him,  
Joel stood his ground and fired the remain-  
ing cartridges. A third bullet was upon  
him he fired his last shot. The bullet  
struck home over the heart, but it had  
been fired too late. With its last and  
tremendous burst of strength the great  
bear grabbed the unfortunate man in its  
death grip and never let go. A party of  
miners bound for Lower Dominion Creek  
found the body a short time after. Joel  
was still in the bear's grasp. It had been  
a fight to the death of both.
