In the afternoon, however, the market faltered and began to sell lower. Railroads suffered a cut back with the rest.

Volume came to 2,020,000 shares. National Theatres was the day's most active issue up 3/4 at 7 on 31,400 shares.

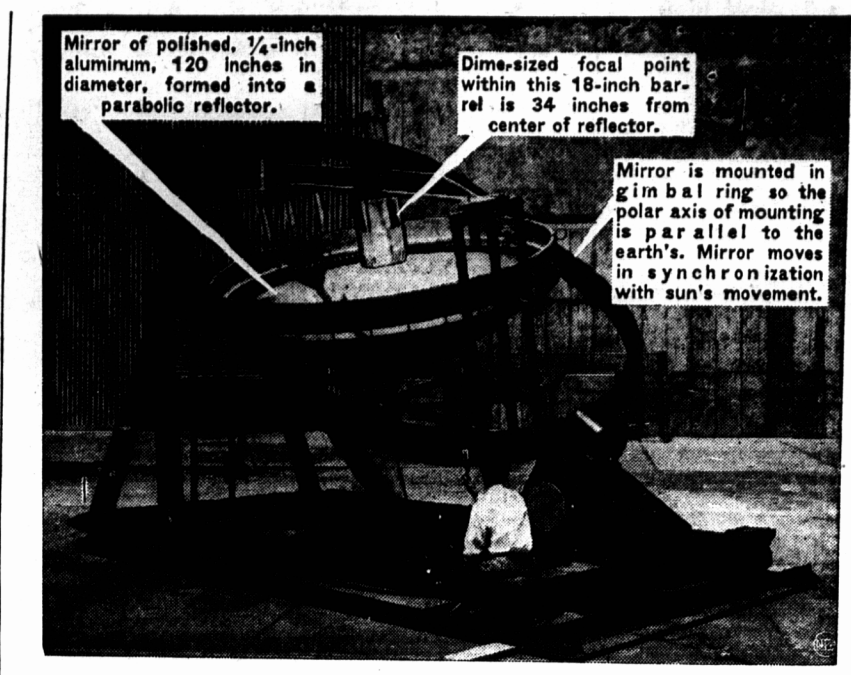
TORONTO (CP)—In light trading on the stock exchange Wednesday senior base metals and uranium were strong. But junior base metals, western oils, golds, Bathurst a n d Manitowadge issues were down in small losses.

Western oil losses outnumbered gains about three to one. Biggest losers were Canso, down 25 cents, and Home Oil, down 15.

In senior base metals Consolidated Smelters, Hudson Fay, International Nickel and Noranda forged ahead in fractions. Junior losses were in pennies. New Calumet gained eight cents. Platinum gains were in pennies. Brunhurst was the only Bathurst gainer. Golds were down in all categories. McIntyre and Kerr-Addison taking 25-cent losses.

Closing indexes: golds up .05 to 73.86; base metals up .71 to 14.12; and western oils down .25 to 92.33.

can develop a temperature of 8500 degrees (F.). That's about 85 per cent of the temperature of the sun's surface. An oxyacetylene torch produces about 5800 degrees. Advantages of a solar furnace for research are that heating is accomplished under very pure conditions. There is no interference from electric or magnetic fields or from gases. Using the solar furnace principle, you can light a cigarette with the sun's rays. Insert the cigarette in an ordinary flashlight reflector (photo at right) and point it at the sun.
