

China and Japan.

A WAR IMMINENT BETWEEN CHINA AND JAPAN.

A despatch received in London says that Russia is preparing to fight China in alliance with Tashkend, and also forcing Japan into the quarrel with China, on the Loo Choo question. China raised 80,000,000 taels for war purposes. Some attribute China's perverse course to British influence. Japan is re-organizing its army on the European plan. The London Post says Russia and England are striving to ferment the war between China and Japan. England backs China with the hope of weakening Russia. Russia is backing Japan as a defence against the aggressions of China. There is little doubt but that war would have been precipitated last summer, but for the accidental presence of a resident President and his council, by which he strengthened the peace party. Unless American diplomacy intervenes, and the American Government mediates, there is a prospect of a cruel war between China and Japan.

A TALE OF CAMBRIDGE MARRIED LIFE.

What appears to be one of the most distressing instances of man's infidelity and utter disregard of marriage vows has just come to light in Cambridge, Mass., and created a great sensation in the leading circles of society in which the parties moved. On Tuesday, March the 2nd, Morris Boynton, of the firm of Ulley & Boynton, produce commission merchants, engaged Wiggin and Wood, private detectives, to find out the movements of his son-in-law, Herman Wellington. The young man married his daughter five years ago. He had given them a house costing \$10,000, and made Wellington an equal partner, but recently he left the firm. The detectives claim to have discovered that Wellington was unfaithful to his wife, and had transferred his attentions to a pretty married woman who lived in the same city. He was in the habit of starting out in the morning, and after walking long distances, to pass and re-pass the house of this woman until he attracted her attention, when he would hold long consultations with her from the sidewalk. He was, it is said, completely infatuated by the woman, who, it is understood, does not live with her husband. She apparently reciprocated his love, and they appeared to be very happy in each other's company. Mr. Boynton in the meantime asserts that he had discovered a possible reason for the resignation of Wellington, in the alleged fact that he had been stealing money from the firm by forging false entries to the amount of \$3,000 or \$4,000. The worst charge of all against the young man is an attempt to poison his wife and two children. They were all taken sick in January, and the boy died. Wellington has bought arsenic several times, but he says it was to kill dogs and cats, and none of it could have got into the food. He was arraigned on a charge of forgery on the 17th, and held in \$2,000 bail.

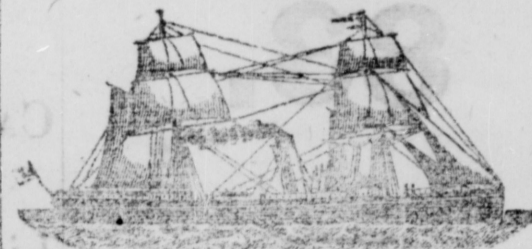

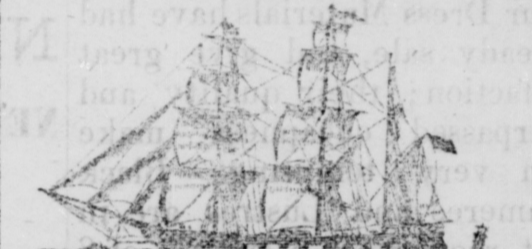
