Agriculture.

SAVE THE MANURE.

Farmers are not aware how much is wasted on their farms, that with little care and trouble might be made into valuable manure. Every thing that can be decomposed either in process of time, with the assistance of the elements, or by the aid of chemical agents, should be saved for the compost heap. Select some place in the barnyard, or adjacent lot where it will be convenient of access, and there gather your compost, adding from time to time such solvents as may be necessary. Here bring all the weeds, sods, briars, thistles, &c., that you are compelled to dig and cut up through the summer, and add to these from time to time whatever you have of waste material, muck from the swamp, decayed fruits, potato vines, leaves, the deposits from the sink, &c., and at the close of the year you will be surprised at the size of your heap, and be able to see for yourselves how much is really wasted on your farms, that might be turned to valuable account.—Rural American.
