Household Hints.

Citron Preserves.—Put a layer of grape leaves in a kettle, then a layer of shapes sprinkled lightly with alum; another of shapes sprinkled as before; then cover with boiling water, and boil until you have a nice brittle shape, have ready a strong ginger tea, in which boil half an hour one and a half pound of sugar to a pound of shapes; add a considerable quantity of water to the sugar, and boil the shapes until preserved; if the syrup is not thick enough, boil down.

Boston Plum Pudding.—One loaf of baker's bread, cut in thin slices and buttered; butter the pan well; put a layer of bread and of raisens, a little cinnamon, nutmeg and sugar; then a layer of buttered bread, and continue until the pan is full; put milk enough around it to soak it one night; cover it with a plate to keep it down; before putting it into the oven beat from three to seven eggs, according to size of pudding, milk enough to have it moist, but not to have it run over in the oven.

Cottage Pudding. One cupful of milk, one-half cupful of sugar, one pint of flour, three eggs, two spoonfuls of cream of tartar, and one of soda, added before baking.

Citron Cake.—One cupful of good butter and two of white sugar, beaten to a cream; three cupfuls sifted flour, four well beaten eggs, whites and yolks separately—one cupful sweet milk, one teaspoonful of cream tartar sifted in the flour, one half teaspoonful soda dissolved in the milk, half pound of citron (or less) cut in very thin pieces, well dredged with flour and added to the last; flavor with lemon or rose.
