Whereas, The Provincial Government have decided to hold an exhibition of the manufacturing, mechanical, and agricultural industries of this Province, in this city, in the autumn of 1883, and the Dominion of Canada, procp so it as a Dominion and Centennial Exhibition by a liberal grant of money;

Therefore Resolved, That this meeting heartily approves of the action of the Provincial and Dominion Government in the matter, and pledges itself to give all possible aid in making the Exhibition successful.

A general committee was appointed, other resolutions were passed, and the meeting, which was a very large one, adjourned with three cheers for General Wolseley.
