## Red Cross In Black During '58, Provincial Executive Is Told

In giving the highlights of the annual meeting of the Central Council, Canadian Red Cross Society, which took place at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto, at the regular monthly meeting of the provincial Red Cross executive in Charlottetown on Thursday evening, Judge J. S. DesRoches, who presided, announced that the provincial executive had elected as the chairman of the Central Council, Mr. J. S. DesRoches, and as a portion of international activities, Dr. Stanbury reviewed the society's program for the reunion of families separated by war and civil disturbances.

Mr. Stearns was in Charlottetown, accompanied by Mrs. Stearns, early in February when he addressed the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Red Cross. Dr. Bruce Shaw, also of Toronto, who was the honorary treasurer for the past two years, and formerly national chairman of the Red Cross campaign, succeeds Mr. Stearns as the chairman of the national executive committee.

Judge DesRoches said it was gratifying to be able to report that for the first time in three years, the Canadian Red Cross operated in 1958 with a slight excess of revenue over expenditure. The operation of the Red Cross programs and services across Canada required an expenditure of \$5,840,041, while revenues totaled \$5,885,83. An additional amount of \$1,022,312 was disbursed from Red Cross designated funds, making a total expenditure of \$6,862,354 for the year.

An assessment of the work of the Canadian Red Cross since the granting of its charter 50 years ago was the theme of the traditional national commemorative report presented by Dr. W. S. Stanbury, the society's chief executive officer.

For the excellence of this report Dr. Stanbury was given a standing ovation by the 60 delegate group comprising Central Council which is made up of three

days. For a similar offence a Central Railway resident received a reprimand.

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## Disturbance Charges Bring \$20 Fines In County Court

A young Charlottetown man who was previously remanded on a charge of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol re-appearing before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., in Queen's County Magistrate's Court, yesterday afternoon, was given an adjournment until Friday, May 22nd.

Police evidence presented disclosed that during the investigation the speech of the accused was incoherent, his eyes blood-shot and didn't appear to focus correctly and he was unsteady on his feet.

The investigating officer stated that a search of the accused and his car revealed no unaccounted liquor. It was also stated that after being taken to the RCMP barracks for documentation, the accused was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital for the purpose of obtaining a blood test. The result of this test was not revealed to the court.

Allison Gillis is counsel for the accused while the crown is represented by John P. Nicholson.

Also on the docket four residents of North Rustico all charged with creating a disturbance in a public place by shouting and swearing, were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Residents of Breadalbane and Corwall charged with operating motor vehicles with defective equipment (lights, etc.) were each fined \$5 and costs or five days.

For passing another vehicle, going in the same direction, on the right hand side a resident of Kelly's Cross was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days. A fine of \$10 and costs or five days was imposed upon a Pownal man for operating a non-registered vehicle.
