Storm Of Protest In Greece

Britain Banishes Greek Archbishop From Cyprus

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—Britain banished Archbishop Makarios III Friday. It accused the head of the Greek Orthodox Church and the rebellious Greek community on Cyprus of being committed to violence to drive the British from this island colony and unite it with Greece.
The prelate and three other leaders of Enosis—the union with Greece movement—were shipped off to an undisclosed destination. An announcement by the British government, Sir John Harding, said the step was taken under emergency regulations "in the interest of promoting peace, order and good government."
It declared the archbishop "now is so far committed to the use of violence for political ends that he either cannot or will not abandon it."
Makarios was apprehended at the airport as he prepared to board a plane for Athens, where he was to confer with the Greek government.
In Greece, thousands of Athenians had flocked to the airport to welcome Makarios. Enosis always has had enthusiastic popular and official support in Greece. News of Makarios' deportation provoked a stormy procession of students through Athens' streets and riot squads were sent to guard the British embassy. Greek political leaders called the British action "a founding brutal action."
(Reuters news agency reported there were also anti-British demonstrations in Salonika in northern Greece. More than 30 persons were injured in clashes between police and demonstrators in the main square of the Macedonian city.)
The British action seemed certain to set off new troubles in the tinder of Middle East nationalism and passion.
Negotiations between British Colonial Secretary Alan Lennox-Boyd and Makarios collapsed last Monday. The archbishop defied British threats of armed might to crush the disorders created by Eoka, the terrorist organization operating on behalf of Enosis. Before talking with Lennox-Boyd, Makarios had conferred off and on for five months with Harding.
WANTED FULL CONTROL
Britain expelled Cyprus self-government within the Commonwealth with internal security and defence remaining in British hands. But Makarios held out for amnesty for all political offenders including those convicted of murdering British soldiers, absolute Cypriot control of internal security and a written guarantee that the Greek-speaking majority would control the legislature.
There is a minority of about 100,000 Cypriots of Turkish descent who want Britain to keep Cyprus and say that if the British leave the island must revert to Turkey from whom Britain got it in 1878. The government of Turkey also has taken this stand.
At UN headquarters in New York Greek Ambassador Christian K. Palamas said the British action showed "how right Greece was in asking the United Nations to consider the Cyprus case last fall" and called the banishing of Makarios "a blow to the free world."
"They asked us to follow the path of quiet diplomacy," said Palamas. "We know and all the members of the United Nations will see where the path of quiet diplomacy, as the Cyprus case last fall, is leading. I am afraid the reaction in Greece will be very strong."

Court Cases At Summerside

In county magistrate's court, Summerside yesterday the hearing of a party from Borden, charged with entering a dwelling house, without lawful excuse, and with intent to commit an indictable offence was adjourned until March 16th.
The charge resulted from an incident in Borden on February 3rd when the accused is alleged to have entered a C.N.R. bunk-car without the consent of the occupant, intent to commit an offence. In his statement, to the court, the accused admitted entering the car but stated he was looking for a friend with whom he had been in company earlier that evening. The case of a man from Lower Malpeque charged with stealing a pung sleigh was adjourned for sentence until March 23rd after the accused pleaded guilty.
Three men from Lennox Island were charged under the Indian Act, the first being sentenced to 30 days in jail for being intoxicated on an Indian reserve; the second was fined \$20.00 and costs after pleading guilty to the same charge and was sentenced to 30 days in jail as well for assault causing bodily harm. The case of the third man, who faces the same two charges as the latter, was adjourned until March 16th.

Aluminum led the upswing in the base metals with a 5 1/2-point climb. International Nickel gained 2 1/4, Noranda 1 1/4 and Consolidated Smelters 3/4. In a strong rail section, Algoma climbed 1 1/2 points and Stecco 1 1/4.
Papers advanced as Consolidated Brown International and Donohue each gained a point. Shawinigan gained 3/4 in the utilities and CPR 1/2 in the carriers.
Prices advanced in active trading in the mining-western oil section. Bouzan, Chib Mining, Merrill Island, Okata, Virginia and Quebec Chib were all two-figure winners. Slight losses were seen in Duvan, Canuba and Cleveland Copper. In the seniors, Campbell Chib gained 1 1/2 points.
