

Islanders Obtain Two New Hockey Players; Boosters Foot The Bill

The Islanders Hockey Club, seeking both offensive and defensive power, obtained two hockey players last night, it was announced last night by coach Murph Chamberlain.

Gus Gustavson, a big burly 25 year old defenseman was purchased from Syracuse of the American Hockey League and Charles Holdway, a 20 year old left winger was obtained from the Vancouver Canucks.

Gustavson, whose hockey title is "The Big Swede" is supposed to leave Syracuse this morning and may be ready to play here Friday night against the Glace Bay Miners. He was bought yesterday afternoon about four o'clock and the money, raised by the Boosters Club, was wired to Eddie Shore immediately.

Big Gus played three years with Tacoma in the Pacific Coast League after graduating from Junior hockey and each year he was chosen on the P.C.H.L. All Stars. Last year he was obtained by Chamberlain at Vancouver where he played for several months before being traded to Syracuse.

Murph obtained four players for the American Hockey League. Among the players were Gary Gordon and Bill Hagen. He also obtained forwards by the name of Propane and Currie both of whom are in the Western Hockey League.

Murph rates him as a tough defenceman. He can hit well, has a good shot and can carry the puck. He was the property of the New York Rangers until last year. Two seasons ago the Rangers rated him as the best prospect in their chain.

Charlie Holdway should be here Sunday. The big left winger is due to leave Vancouver on the 12:20

plane Friday night. Holdway is a big rangy, six foot, two inch hockey player weighing 185 pounds. This is his first year out of junior hockey but last year with Prince Albert he scored 45 goals. He is the property of the New York Rangers.

Chamberlain states that he has a good shot and is a good two way hockey player. "The kind of a fellow who will put a lot of life into the club" stated the Hardrock. At the same time it was learned that the Islanders had procured the services of Big Fitz Fraser who last year played with the Ottawa Senators. Fraser this year has been in retirement running a Motel business in Ontario.

However Tommy Gorman of Ottawa gave Chamberlain the green light to go ahead and deal with Fraser. Several Ontario clubs are also after his services. The additions of Gustavson and Holdway will raise the number of Islanders players to 17, one above the player limit set by the league. In making the announcement Chamberlain stated that the attendance at the games will have to increase in order that the players salaries may be paid. To date the Islanders with 12, 13 or 14 players on the pay roll on various weeks have been able to meet the pay roll but not too much more.

Murph stated that he can obtain the players if the fans can support them. He figures that he will need an average of about 300 more fans at each game in order to keep the club operating in the clear.

The money to purchase the players was raised by the Boosters Club. The Boosters have been working for almost three weeks to raise this money and are still continuing their drive.

Minor Leagues End Player Draft

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 3 — (AP) — The minor league baseball draft today ended their player draft with a total of 116 selections for \$236,100, a new low in the four-year history of the open draft.

As the majors selected 11 players for \$120,000 Monday, the week-long total of players drafted was 127 for \$356,100. A year ago the minors picked 133 for \$315,000 and the majors 18 for \$169,000. However, the major and minor drafts were not held at the same meeting last year.

The record was set in 1949, the first year, when 22 players were drafted for \$449,050.

Minor Leagues Clear Decks For Important Votes

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 3 — (AP) — Baseball's minor leagues cleared the decks for tomorrow's important votes on the bonus rule, 24-hour recall and radio-television problems after today's final draft sessions. The only important news out of a brief evening session of the convention was a recommendation of the realignment committee that franchises be issued for a definite term of years and not on a perpetual basis.

Frank Lane, general manager of Chicago White Sox and chairman of the realignment group, also suggested the minors concentrate on promoting cities over 100,000 to build stadiums.

The real rights will come behind closed doors at tomorrow's executive session when the 47 amendments and two resolutions will come up for action. Two new bonus rules will be considered — one proposed by the major-minor executive council and one by New York Yankees through their Kansas City farm club. The idea is to put teeth in a rule that would discourage big bonus payments to untried free agents. In a nutshell, the council plan limits movements of any free agent who gets more than \$4,000 for signing a big league contract. The Yankee plan restores the old \$8,000 ceiling that was voted out a few years back.

The Yankee plan also provides for bigger fines for violations. Although most league presidents refused to indicate which way his league will vote, there was strong trend toward the executive council idea.
