ILLUSTRATED SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Scripture—John 14:16, 17, 25, 26; 15:4-15; Acts 1:4-7, 10; Romans 8:1-7.

At the Last Supper, Christ told His disciples that He would be leaving them soon and that, although He knew they would be sad, He would send them "another Comforter, to be with you for ever... the Spirit of truth" (John 14:16-17).

His promise was fulfilled the day of Pentecost. The disciples were gathered together in Jerusalem, when a sound like rushing wind came from Heaven and tongues of fire lighted on them. "And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:1-4).

Immediately the disciples were able to speak many foreign languages. An amazed crowd gathered, some saying the disciples were drunk. Peter explained to the people that the Spirit of God had come to them, as prophesied (see 2:14-18).

Peter told the crowd to repent of their great sin of crucifying Christ and be baptized, and they would receive the Holy Spirit—a promise for them and for all future generations (see 2:37-42).

Acting Highways Minister Andrew MacRae said yesterday he has received Attorney-General Mevin McQuill's recommendation that yield-right-of-way signs on provincial highways be recommended.

"Department officials," said Mr. MacRae, "have not yet studied the recommendation, but it is likely that it will be followed."

Mr. McQuill's recommendation followed a Supreme Court ruling that the Highway Traffic Act does not properly define "yield." He said that in his opinion "yield signs constitute a danger to traffic and should be removed." He said an amendment to the Highway Traffic Act is contemplated which would properly define "yield." The recommendation does not apply to Charlottetown, or incorporated towns whose by-laws properly define "yield."

NEW YORK (AP) — Georgia-Pacific Corporation has declined comment on published reports it is negotiating to purchase the St. Croix Paper Co.

Georgia-Pacific, one of the largest U.S. forest products companies, is based on the west coast and has extensive timber holdings in that region, the southeast and the south.

St. Croix, based in Bangor, Me., owns more than 600,000 acres in Maine and New Brunswick; produced about 150,000 tons of newsprint last year.
