THE BOY'S BRIGADE.

**Many Visitors to Their Camp.—
 Impromptu Concert.**

There was a great number of visitors at the camp of the Boys' Brigade at Victoria Barracks last night, and much interest was taken in what was going on. The little fellows are doing exceedingly well, and like camp life splendidly.

The impromptu concert under the direction of Captain Watts was a very pleasing affair. The programme was made up of solos, choruses, recitations and addresses, all of which were thoroughly enjoyed. Harry Smith's recitations were pleasing features, and the addresses of Capt. Withycombe, Captain Tidmarsh and Major Stewart were timely and to the point. Captain Watts also made some interesting remarks, and the proceedings closed with the National Anthem.

The Boy's Brigade will march to church tomorrow morning and in the afternoon an open air service will be held on the cricket grounds, Victoria Park, at 3.45 p. m. Rev. Mr. Withycombe, the father of the Boy's Brigade in this Island, will preach and Captain Watts will have charge of the choir, in which he expects over one hundred trained voices.

Boys will be at liberty tomorrow to take tea at their homes. They must report at camp at 9 p. m.

This evening's service will be conducted by the Rev. Mr. McConnell.

After drill this afternoon, the boys will engage in cricket and base ball.

The inspection will take place on Monday at 3 p. m.

The health of the boys is excellent, conduct exemplary.

The orders of tomorrow are in substance as follows: Divine service parade at 10.15 a. m. Parade will march into town headed by the Artillery Band, who very kindly offered their services for the day. Boys will march to their respective churches. Assembling after service at Rockford Square.

Permission is granted to the boys to go to their respective Sunday schools, but boys must be in camp in time for the divine service parade at 3.45. Fall in at 3.30 p. m. Headed by the band the parade will be formed on the cricket grounds in three sides of a hollow square, massed drums with colors on the face of the square. The commandant has ordered one thousand copies of the hymns for distribution among the visitors. After the service the boys will be permitted to join their friends and, if they wish, to attend evening service with them.
