News of the sudden passing of Mr. J. Wallace Downe came with a shock of profound sorrow to his friends and relatives.

Taken suddenly ill on Saturday, he entered Aberdeen Hospital, New Glasgow, N. S., where his spirit winged its way to its maker in the early hours of Monday, February 10th, 1947.

Always skillful with her fingers, she worked many beautiful pieces in crocheting and sewing. During World War I and II, she knitted many articles for the Red Cross and was always generous with her donations to any worthy cause.

Miss Rogers was born in Pictou on the old Rogers homestead, where her brother George now lives. She spent most of her life in the United States, coming back to Pictou 25 years ago to live with her sister, Mrs. Jonah Lewis, who predeceased her three years ago. Since then, she has been with George Lewis and his wife, who made their home there six years.

The funeral service was held from the home Monday afternoon at 2 P. M. with Rev. Ralph Wagner in charge assisted by Rev. C. A. Britten. Rev. Gordon Vincent Supports Stand Taken By Truro Minister

HALIFAX, March 19 — (CP) — Rev. Gordon Vincent, pastor of the West End Baptist Church here, in a sermon tonight defended the action of Rev. Perry Rockwood, Truro, N.S., minister who resigned from the Presbyterian Church in Canada after being brought before a church court on a charge of following a divisive course.

"I take off my hat to the young minister who fearlessly stuck to his belief in his God," Mr. Vincent said. Although saying he did not condone everything Mr. Rockwood has said and done, Mr. Vincent asked what the same church court would have done with Martin Luther, John the Baptist and John Wesley, all of whom he termed "dividers."

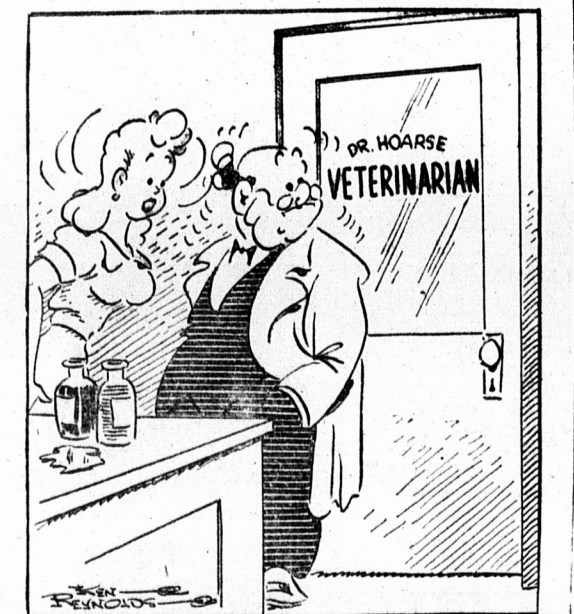
