

5 Proposals For Cyprus Before United Nations

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UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—
Faced with five differing proposals involving the future of the British Mediterranean island of Cyprus, the UN Assembly's political committee Monday night was reported open to further compromise efforts, perhaps Canada.

The Cyprus debate which opened here last week appeared far from settlement this evening with several delegations pressing for night meetings to wind it up and clear the way for consideration of the similarly touchy Algerian issue. Also scheduled for the committee's attention before the scheduled Dec. 13 adjournment is a study of the effects of atomic radiation.

There was no word from the Canadian delegation Monday on whether it would back or institute efforts to group the five committee motions into a generally

acceptable compromise for later approval by the General Assembly. Canada did not place herself on the speakers' list on Cyprus.

MAJOR POSITIONS

Three major positions must be reconciled to achieve an agreement here on the strategic island. Britain, as the governing power, wants approval by the General Assembly to go on with her own plans for an eventual settlement involving the Greek Cypriot majority and the Turkish-descended minority in Cyprus. Greece has come out flatly for independence while Turkey has called for partitioning of the island into Greek and Turkish sectors.

The two other resolutions being studied now are neutralist-led expressions in most general terms of a desire for a peaceful settlement involving the UN. They are not expected to win the support of the Greek and Turkish principals.

On the political side, two speakers in the debate Monday expressed pro and con views on the British position. Sir Claude Goerz of Ceylon, representing a former British colony which now has achieved independence within the Commonwealth, praised Britain's record as a colonial power and predicted that if the Cypriot elements drop their campaign of violence, independence can be achieved in time.

On the partition issue, Dr. Connor O'Brien of the Republic of Ireland compared the situation with the division of Ireland into British Ulster and the southern republic.
