Irma a Douce Comedy Sets Precedent On Trip

Irma LA DOUCE, the saucy French musical comedy which has taken Vancouver by storm this season, opens at Confederation Centre, Monday, August 3 for a week's engagement.

The Vancouver International Festival production, playing to capacity houses in Vancouver's Playhouse theatre, moves directly from west to east overnight. This is the first time in Canadian history that a theatrical company closes Saturday night in Vancouver, crosses the continent and opens Monday night in the Maritimes.

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Spirits Possession Brings Two Fines

SUMMERISIDE — Appearing on identical charges of unlawful possession of illicit spirits, Vincent Joseph Doucette, Tignish Run, and Eric Joseph Mac-

Janis, Tignish, were each fined \$100 and costs or three months by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County court yesterday morning.

The charges were laid after many complaints and following intensive investigation by members of the Alberton RCMP detachment. When arrested in a house in possession of two gallons of "moonshine".

Three Tignish youths were each sentenced to 15 days in Prince County Jail as a result of an egg throwing incident in Tignish.

Two of the youths, Cecil Arsenault and Valmore Richard were charged with loitering and obstruction while the third youth, Alban Doucette appeared on a different charge in connection with the incident.

The following appeared on charges of speeding and were each fined \$10 and costs: John Pleasance, St. Eleanor's; Miss Mary Carolyn Campbell, Kensington; Roger Ernest Arsenault, RCAP Bagerville; Harold Joseph Durant, Richmond; and Patrick Torrens, RCAP Summerside.

80 MPH

An Urbainville man, M. A. Joseph Gallant, pleaded not guilty to a charge of driving without the care and attention and his case was adjourned to August 13. The accused was represented by J. Melville Gernibell on a similar charge. Gerald Edward O'Halloran, Hamilton, Ont., was fined \$10 and costs.

The case of a third man, Daryl Arthur Newson, Augustin Cove, charged with driving without due care and attention, was adjourned for decision to August 4th following testimony of the complainant, Mrs. Mabel Gaudet, Bequete, Mrs. Agnes Gaudet, also of Bequete, and Donald Shears, a member of the Borden RCMP detachment and the accused.

Newson, who had pleaded not guilty to the charge, was represented by Neil R. MacLeod.

Centennial Plans Are Laid At Cardigan Village Meet

CARDIGAN — At an informal meeting of the ratopayers of Cardigan village, held in the school Monday evening, it was stressed that very little time was left, and very much work still to be completed to prepare for the centennial celebration, Saturday, August 5.

Sports events will be held in the morning and plays are being finalized to hold Services at 11:30 a.m. in both St. Andrew's and All Saints churches. All events will be held on the sports field and the day will wind up with an open air dance.

THE REV. PETER GORDON.
Who as the first Presbyterian Pastor in this Province became a member of the Executive of the General Assembly of the United Church of Canada in 1906.
He was born in Caveston, Scotland, in 1879.
Studied in Glasgow and Whitburn, and was ordained and inducted by the Presbytery of F. He died at Brackley Point, on April 24, 1964, and was buried at St. Peter's. His remains were exhumed and re-interred in the cemetery of St. Peter's on August 22, 1966.

CAIRN IS CENTENNIAL PROJECT

Rev. Peter Gordon. The cairn is located in the old cemetery of St. Peter's Harbor. Mr. Gordon was the first Presbyterian pastor in this province and

became minister of the congregation of Cove Head, St. Peter's and Fortune. He was born in Caveston, Scotland, in 1879, and died at the age of 84. The construction work on this cairn was done by John Denham, Kilnair.
