CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

The Weighing of Hogs Comes up for Consideration

City Hall, October 27, 1898.

To His Worship Mayor Warburton.

Sir,—We the undersigned City Councilors of the City of Charlottetown request you to call a special meeting of the City Council on Monday next, October 31st, at 8 o'clock, p.m., to take into consideration and regulate the weighing of hogs on the City scales and at Messrs Rattenbury's pork factory.

Council Chamber City Hall, October 31, 1898.

In compliance with the above requisition a special meeting of the City Council of the City of Charlottetown was held in Council Chamber on Monday, October 31st, at 8 o'clock, pm.

There were present His Worship Mayor Warburton, His Honor Recorder Haszard, and all the City Councilors.

After considerable discussion His Honor the Recorder informed the Council that they were powerless to pass any by-law making special provision for the weighing of hogs. It having been brought to the notice of the Council that Mr McLeod had been appointed by the Board of Trade under the provision of their Act of Incorporation the Council were unanimous in endorsing the action of the Board in appointing him, he being a certified weigher and duly sworn.

It also appeared that in addition to the fact of Mr McLeod being appointed by the Board of Trade, whose only object was to see justice done between all parties, the scales are subject to inspection by the Government Inspector of Weights and Measures and consequently there was no reason for the present state of dissatisfaction amongst the farmers, as it was next to impossible for wrong-doing to take place.

The Council, one and all, felt the importance of allaying the discontent, if possible, but found that under the present circumstances they were powerless to act.

AFTER AN ANCHOR.—The steamer H E Rennels arrived here yesterday, and is lying at Pownal wharf. The Rennels is from Buffalo and will leave here for Philadelphia. Coming down the St Lawrence a leak was discovered in her boilers and she "laid too" to have the necessary repairs made. While so engaged a gale came up and both anchors had to be slipped. The steamer then came to Charlottetown after an anchor, which, we understand, was supplied by Captain Ronald McMillan.

PROHIBITION DEMANDED.—The following joint resolution, which speaks for itself, has been adopted by the two Alliances in this city and province:

Whereas the government has pledged itself to prohibition when it is the will of the people; and whereas a plebiscite has been taken showing a majority in favor of prohibition;

Therefore the Provincial and Temperance Alliances unitedly call upon the government to fulfil its pledge by giving us a Dominion prohibition law at the coming session.

We particularly request Sir L. H. Davies and the other Island members to strongly support the government in passing this law.

Local and Other Items.

POLICE COURT.—This morning George Ridd was fined \$4 or 20 days for drunkenness.

ALL SAINTS' DAY.—Memorial service and sermon on "The State of the Departed" in St Peter's Cathedral this evening at 7.30.

COMMITTED TO JAIL.—Major Howatt, who was yesterday fined \$100 or three months imprisonment for violating the Liquor Regulation Act, has been committed to jail.

PRODUCE SHIPPED.—The schooner Janie, Captain Roberts, left Summerside for Newfoundland yesterday, with the following cargo: 780 bus oats, 600 bus potatoes, 13 cattle, 4 pigs, 2 horses, 26 sheep, 20 geese, 20 ducks, 10 turkeys, 40 chickens, 15 tons hay and a quantity of butter and cheese.

C. T. A. CONVICTIONS.—At Mount Stewart, on the 29th October, convictions were secured by Prosecutor Brown against Patrick Doyle and Mary Jane McQuaid for infractions of the Canada Temperance Act, and both were fined \$50 and costs. Today, at the same place, Gertrude McKenna was fined the same sum for a similar offence, and the case against Laura McKenna was dismissed.

DIED YESTERDAY.—We hear with regret of the death of Mr John McLaughlin, brakeman on the Island Railway, which occurred at his home near Douglas Station yesterday. We have not heard the exact cause of death, but understand that Mr McLaughlin has suffered from blood-poisoning for some time past, the result of an injury to his hand. The deceased was a brother of Dr McLaughlin, of St Peter's Bay, and was about twenty-four years of age. He was a young man of excellent character, and had many friends by whom his death will be mourned.

THE BOSTON BOAT.—The Halifax arrived this morning about five o'clock, and left on return at the usual time this afternoon. Her inward passengers were: Mrs Wm Cain and one, A McInnes, C A Kelley, Miss A Dewar, P Bernard, A Heywood, Mrs J J McLean, Mrs G A C Clements, Mrs Reddin, Master Reddin. From Halifax: P Blake, Miss Blake, Capt Florin and crew of the barge Alice, Capt McGillivray and crew of the barge Mabel. The out going passengers included: O Rattenbury, Mrs W L Musgrave, Eliza O'Connell, Mary O'Connell, W B Sellers, Mrs Westaway.

A CHANGE.—A change has been made in the running arrangements of the steamer Princess. She will leave here as usual tomorrow morning at seven o'clock, but will not leave Pictou on return until after the arrival of the midnight train and may not be expected in Charlottetown until about six o'clock in the morning. After tomorrow the Princess will leave for Pictou at nine o'clock each morning, and will be due in Charlottetown about six as above stated. The incoming mails will be carried by the Princess, and the outgoing mails will be despatched by the Northumberland as usual.

FACED A CYCLONE.—According to the story told by an exchange, the bark Irma, Captain Taylor, had a thrilling experience while in Gaudeloupe, West Indies. She had nearly all of her cargo discharged when a cyclone struck the coast. To save his ship from utter destruction Capt Taylor had to cut the cables and put to sea. By doing so he was running a great risk, as the mighty sea was lashed into foam by the cyclone. Only by good management was the vessel kept afloat. After seven days she again reached Gaudeloupe, having run before the cyclone for many miles and was fortunate in escaping damage. On returning to port to discharge the balance of her cargo Capt Taylor learned that the cyclone had caused great destruction to property and loss of many lives at Gaudeloupe. It swept the coast with terrible fury and almost destroyed Kingston. Capt. Taylor lost one raft of lumber which is the only loss he sustained.

LAST NIGHT'S ENTERTAINMENT.—A good audience enjoyed an excellent programme in Kindergarten Hall last evening. The musical numbers given by Miss Collings, Mrs Norton, the Misses Butler, Mr Mitchell and Mr T A McLean, jr, were well rendered, and heartily received by the audience. Miss Lefurgey was down for two readings and was compelled to give four. She possesses a fine voice, and a good presence on the platform, and is able to enter fully into the spirit of the author she interprets and therefore is always sure of a good house when she reads. Four bright boys at the intermission sold good homemade candy. The entertainment was under the auspices of the Ladies Aid Society of the First Methodist church.
