here by "flying boxcars" to serve the many people being employed in the iron ore sections.

No Difficulty Anticipated
 He urged the members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce to keep agitating for the extra length for the airport runways as such a development was really the responsibility of the Federal Government once the City had provided the necessary land. He did not anticipate any difficulty with landowners in the vicinity whose land would be needed as he believed they, too, would see the value of such a project.

Chairman at the meeting last night was Dr. John E. Sterns, president of the Chamber, who introduced Mayor Stewart and City Clerk James E. Fullerton. At the conclusion of his talk Mayor Stewart was thanked by Mr. Ralph Dumont who expressed the appreciation of Chamber members for the insight into civic affairs given by the Mayor.

Mayor Stewart gave it as his opinion that this city did not receive nearly enough in the way of public works from the Federal Government. He stated that he wanted to emphasize this point so the residents would continue to agitate for a greater proportion of the work being done. There are three big projects which he felt citizens should push for and they were the airport, the proposed Federal Building and a new Naval Barracks.

Civic Financing
 In a brief outline of civic financing he said that the City was receiving only \$43,000 from the Provincial Government in lieu of the corporation, and other taxes which it forgoes. "Charlottetown has only one way of raising money, and that is from the pockets of the tax payers."
 Discussing the higher rates for electricity now being charged the Mayor stated that residents of the City could expect to pay higher water rates in the near future as all the water supplied the city is pumped electrically.

Misconceptions Re Proposed Bus Service Cleared Up At Joint Meeting With CNR Men

Members of the Summerside Town Council and the Summerside Board of Trade met three representatives of the Canadian National Railway last evening in the town hall to discuss the proposed CNR bus service in this province.

The three representatives from the CNR were: Mr. C. J. Montgomery, superintendent of the Prince Edward Island Division, Mr. Frank A. Gaffney, chief of transport research and Mr. L. J. MacDonald. The meeting was presided over by Mr. A. S. Hopkins, president of the Board of Trade and was addressed by Mr. Gaffney who outlined the service which the Canadian National Railway proposes to inaugurate.

Mr. Gaffney said that "in essence we are trying to remove various mixed train services and to give instead a top notch bus service. The Railway will continue to function as before but we think that in using this bus service we can give the best service you have ever had in this Province for the convenience of the public."

Mr. Gaffney invited the joint meeting to ask questions and that he would endeavor to clear up any points that they were raised. He pointed out that the proposed bus service would be a subsidiary of the C.N.R. but would be under the direct control of the P.E.I. Public Utilities Commission. He said that the C.N.R. has no intention or desire to interfere with franchise of the Island Motor Transport. "We will set our schedule," he said, "so as not to interfere with the I.M.T."

To Speak At RCAF Station Tonight



Group Captain F. R. (Pete) West, (shown above) Chief Inspector of Aeronautical Accidents for the R. C. A. F., who will address the R. C. A. F. personnel and members of the R. C. A. F. Wing Association at the station theatre tonight.

Group Captain West, recognized as one of Canada's outstanding aviators has over 3000 hours in the air. His flying has brought him to all parts of the world, the Arctic, the West Indies, the Middle East, the Far East and Europe. Early in his air force career, in the "thirties" he used to fly the Atlantic "Rhum" patrols in single engine seaplanes. He has flown a great many different types of aircraft from the old Avro to jet fighters, land planes, sea planes and flying boats.

Born at Brockville, he joined the R. C. A. F. in 1934. Group Captain West feels that greater understanding of R. C. A. F. operations and flying accidents can be portrayed through talks such as he will give tonight. He speaks quite openly on some serious accidents, giving causes and resultant preventative action brought about at investigation.

Sabre Jets Fly Over Summerside, Charlottetown

The Sabre jets yesterday sound a break in the heavily overcast sky yesterday afternoon that gave four of them an opportunity to pay what might, by understatement, be called a fast visit to Summerside and Charlottetown.

The four jets flew over Summerside at least six times but as the direction of their approach was always in doubt, every interested observer who did not have a clear view of the sky in all directions had to be sharp to get a look at these speedy aircraft.

Two men who yesterday had a plane ride, they will probably long remember were Group Captain A. G. Kenyon, officer commanding R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, and Mr. Lowell Huestis, of C.J.R.W. who, each in turn, were taken up in the jet two-seater training plane that is accompanying the Sabre P-85's on the tour.

On the flight on which Mr. Huestis was a passenger, they flew over Kensington and Charlottetown at a speed of 550 miles per hour, in what Mr. Huestis described as a most enjoyable experience. The squadron of 12 jets is due to leave Summerside today for Halifax, and may possibly pass over some of the Island communities on their farewell flight in this visiting tour to Prince Edward Island.
