**ONE HAD A PULL.**—The Moncton Times says: "Two I. C. R. car inspectors in Nova Scotia were dismissed some weeks ago because of neglect of duty. One of them had a pull with a government member and holds his position in spite of the management. This is taking the road out of politics with a vengeance."

**THE LATEST OUT.** A wonderful cure-all is reported from Washington, where a man has applied for a patent. He would put a patient in a glass case, turn on a tremendous electric current, which would be diffused all over the glass and strike every part of the patient with a safe, gentle, but effective force and kill every sort of bacilli. **LAST YEAR'S FIRE LOSS.**—The fire loss of 1898 in Canada and the United States was larger than that of either the two previous years, being \$119,650,500 as compared with \$110,319,650 in 1897 and \$11,655,500 in 1896. The September fire loss was the heaviest of the last year, reaching a total of \$14,203,650, an amount only exceeded in one month in the last three years. Next to September, the heaviest fire loss last year was in December, when the total reached \$12,712,150.

**OUTBREAK OF SMALL POX.**—According to late advices from Montreal some excitement has been caused by an outbreak of small pox which has occurred in the municipalities of Coteau Landing and Coteau du Lac. This is where work on the last section of the famous Soulanges Canal is being carried on. The disease broke out in a small boarding house on November 24. Strict precautionary measures to prevent its spreading were not taken for some time. It is thought that the disease will not spread much further.

**FISHERIES OF THE YUKON.**—A report has been received at the Fisheries Department from a former member of the department staff, now resident in Dawson, dealing with the question of the fisheries of the Yukon and tributary streams. The information says there is a very considerable variety of fish life, including white fish, buffalo, pike, and grayling all edible. They allow of large quantities being taken to satisfy the food supply. In several of the larger lakes fishing companies are at work and find that they are able to realize hand-ome profits. The matter will be made a subject of further investigation and may tend to disprove the generally accepted notion that fish life does not exist to any general extent in waters as far north as the Yukon.

**PROFIT IN OLD EGGS.**—The Montreal Trade Bulletin of last week tells an interesting story about profits resulting from the recent scarcity of eggs. It says: "Sales were reported to us of about 300 cases of limed in different lots at 17 cents, and a car of poor musty limed which sold last week at 8 to 9c, is being jobbed out at 14c. It is surprising what a heap of d fecis is covered up in times of scarcity. This lot of eggs was stored in a pork-packing establishment, and the eggs have a strong briny pork smell and flavor, and yet they are sold, and are being re-sold at a big advance in price. Profits have been made for holders in the west of \$240 to \$400 per car load, and we presume the same has been realized in this market. The car load of musty eggs above referred to which sold at 8 to 9c per dozen, will show a gain of about \$500 to \$600."

**RETURNED THE NUTMEGS.**—It is not often that we find a case of honesty like the one to here mentioned. About four years ago a Weymouth lady had as a helper a girl born in another country. The girl gave good satisfaction and at last let with a recommendation as a good honest hard working domestic. Time passed along and a few days ago a girl went to the lady and asked if she had ever had in her employ Miss Blank and did she ever miss any nutmegs. The answer to the first question was yes, to the latter no. Well you must have (said the girl) for Miss Blanke say she stole them and here are a dozen she asked me to return. It appears at a revival meeting the girl concluded to turn over a new leaf and the stolen nutmegs so worked on her mind, she had no peace until they were returned.—Weymouth Free Press

Fielding's Venerable Fiction.

At a Liberal rally in the hall of the Monument National, Montreal, on the evening of the 3rd, Mr. Fielding indulged in some glorification over the revenue returns for the twelve months ending 30th June last.

He claimed a surplus, but did so by reverting to the use of the venerable juggle between expenditure chargeable to the consolidated fund and chargeable to capital account.

His alleged surplus of \$1,722,000 is purely fictitious, a mere manipulating of bookkeeping entries.

The real figures are:—  
Income for year '68.....\$40,555,000  
Expenditure for year ending June, '98.....42,972,000

Deficit.....\$2,417,000  
The income for these twelve months was the largest the Dominion has known, yet despite of that, 2½ million dollars were spent.

With four million more to spend than in 1896, this is a discouraging showing.—Huntingdon Gleaner (Lib).
