\$250,000 Fire In Lumber Yard

VICTORIA, B.C., June 18 — (CP) — A \$250,000 fire today destroyed the Hudson Lumber Company mill here. Firemen got it under control before it could attack the new British Columbia Forest Products plant nearby. A sudden shift in the wind helped them. Flames and smoke mushroomed hundreds of feet into the air as the mill became a giant torch. Two lumber carriers were rushed to stacks of lumber near the mill. Firemen played streams of water on the drivers to protect them from the intense heat as they carted away the threatened timber. Eyewitnesses said the fire was started by a flash from a motor used to haul logs from the water.

Gave second reading — approval in principle to a measure authorizing the Canadian National Railways to build a 155-mile rail line from Sherbrooke, Man., to tap nickel-copper deposits at Lynn Lake, Man. The line is to cost \$14,735,000. 2. Adopted bills aimed at avoiding double taxation for Canadians engaged in transactions with Sweden and France. 3. Made progress in clause-by-clause study of income-tax amendments resulting from the 1951-52 budget. The House also heard Defence Production Minister Howe say nothing conclusive has been decided as the result of discussions about the accumulation of automobiles in the hands of a Canadian automobile producer. The company was believed to be the Ford Motor Company of Windsor. In another statement, Transport Minister Chevrier told the Commons Great Lakes ships are being diverted from the iron ore-carrying trade to relieve a congestion of grain in Lakehead elevators. Mr. Chevrier said it is expected 16,000,000 bushels will be moved down the lakes by June 23, enough to take care of the immediate situation.

Canadian Dollar

MONTREAL, June 18 — (CP) — The American dollar today closed at 7 per cent premium to the Canadian dollar, up 1/32 from Friday's close. That is, it took \$1.07 Canadian to buy \$1 American. The pound sterling was \$2.99 1/2, up 1/4 from Friday.

Further Aid To Marginal Gold Mines Planned

OTTAWA, June 18 — (CP) — The Federal Government announced tonight that it plans to give further "substantial" assistance to marginal gold mines, those which have a tough time making financial ends meet in the face of a fixed price for their product.

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Kiwanis Leader Makes Reference To Churchmen

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 18 — (CP) — Don H. Murdoch of Winnipeg, president of Kiwanis International, today suggested that spiritual leaders examine their own consciences before questioning the motives behind the good works that others are trying to do. Speaking to more than 10,000 Kiwanis representatives attending the organization's 36th annual convention, Mr. Murdoch referred to a critical report presented to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in Ottawa June 7. The report charged that service clubs and fraternal organizations make use of the Bible, but "ignore or obscure its central testimony to Jesus Christ as redeemer and thus pervert the gospel and entangle men in human error." Mr. Murdoch said Kiwanis International's first object is "to give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than the material values of life." He said it is an organization that practices the brotherhood of mankind in that it supports all churches, regardless of race or creed. "One of our major standing committees is the committee on support of churches in their spiritual aims. Last year, these committees in local clubs throughout Canada, the United States, Alaska and Hawaii sponsored more than 43,000 children in religious schools and camps, promoted 4,373 'go to church' campaigns and supplied 1,010 lay speakers for needy churches. Reviews Work At Experimental Farm

Mr. R. C. Parent, Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, was the principal guest speaker at the regular Rotary luncheon yesterday. A short address was also heard from Mr. H. R. Gillard, Toronto, National Secretary of the Navy League of Canada. The large meeting, which had Rotarians Eric Dewling and Manning Bagnall as its joint chairmen, heard a very interesting address from Mr. Parent on "Work at the Experimental Station." As an introduction to his talk, the speaker pointed out how important the feeding of an ever-expanding world population is, and continued by saying that the production and distribution of food is not only the business of farmers but a concern of business men such as Rotarians and the Governments. He dealt with the physical make-up of the local Station and stated it was started in 1909 with 50 acres of leased land. At the present time it has approximately 400 acres owned by the Federal Government. Also engaged in the work are 8 illustration stations under contract containing approximately 1,500 acres. The Station has also eight other projects, dealing with soil fertility, cranberries, blueberries and orcharding, and the most recent inventory placed the valuation at approximately \$275,000. The permanent staff totals 42, eight of whom have college degrees, and from 10 to 20 persons and over 2,500,000 boys and girls were assisted in some manner by these service-minded men. Mr. Murdoch said it was almost impossible to conceive that any group would take the liberty to judge the motives behind this type of human service.

are taken on for seasonal employment. The yearly pay list at the present time is \$100,000. Mr. Parent concluded his talk by stating that the local Station did business last year with almost 160 Charlottetown firms, and that there are 172 active projects carried on dealing with all phases of farm activities. The work is divided into various divisions which include Animal Husbandry, Field Husbandry, Poultry, Forage Crops, Cereal, Horticulture, Apiary, and Illustration Stations. At the conclusion of his address Mr. Parent showed a series of lantern slides depicting some of the more important projects of the Station. These included soil surveys, soil fertility experiments, field days, livestock and poultry projects and a series on trees, shrubs and flowers.

Smash Dope Ring At Windsor, Ont.

WINDSOR, Ont., June 18 — (CP) — One of the biggest dope rings in the history of Windsor was believed smashed by the R.C.M.P. during the week-end with the arrest of four men facing a total of 31 charges of sale and possession of heroin. The three arrested Saturday — Patrick Riley, 30, Philip Chiamp, 37, and Leonard Grimaldi, 35, all of Windsor — appeared in police court today where bail was set at \$50,000. The fourth man, William Chiamp, brother of Philip, was arrested Sunday. The charges followed a six-week investigation by the R.C.M.P. Narcotics Detail. William E. Kelly, special crown prosecutor, said further charges may be laid. STOCKHOLM — (CP) — Sweden's population on Jan. 1, 1951 for the first time passed the 7,000,000 mark. 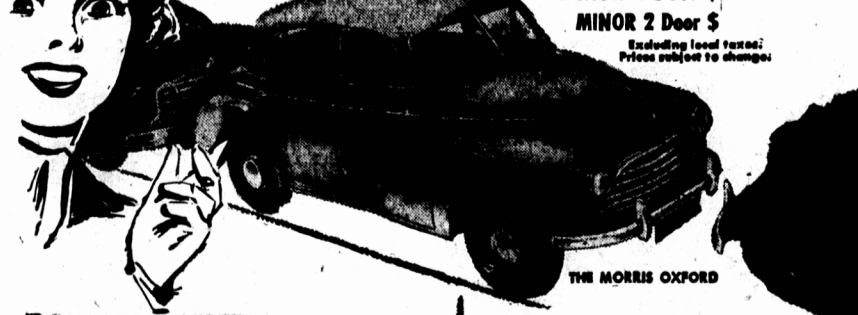
