The regular meeting of the King's County Fish and Game Association was held in the United Church hall, Souris, last evening with the president, Mr. Keith Matheson, presiding. The regular routine business was completed, after which several questions were discussed.

The president spoke briefly respecting the opening shooting season, and urged all to respect the law prohibiting shooting game birds prior to the opening day, and the opening hour. He asked the members of the King's County Fish and Game Association, who are game wardens, to report any violation which came to their attention, and the Association would prosecute the case.

Dr. Edward Kassner, Souris, guest speaker, delivered a timely and instructive address on first aid for gun shooting accidents which might occur. A discussion on teaching young boys the principles of safe gun handling ensued, and it was thought that a program should be active, taking a keen interest in world wide affairs, but especially in the happenings of her own community, where she has resided for so many years.

swinging wide to the left. City Police Sergeant A. J. Dowling testified that he was in charge at the local Police Station the Sunday afternoon of the accident and he went to the scene. He did not measure the various distances but stepped off four paces, about three yards he said, from the white lines marking the pedestrian crossing area to the front of plaintiff's car.

The same car, he stated, was about one foot from the gutter. The Shepherd car was facing east on Grafton with the rear near the Doherty car and on a slight angle. He said the cars were not touching.

When questioned by Mr. Foster he said he would not swear to the exact position of the Shepherd car, but the rear was about in the centre of the street. He stated he saw no brake marks on the street, not any glass or clay. The damage to the Doherty car that he saw was on the side not on the front.

Mr. Earl Shepherd, another son of the defendant, said the car in which they were driving belonged to his brother, Ralph Shepherd, who is now in Quebec. Witness noticed they had a green light as they made the turn off Weymouth street to Grafton going east on their way to New Perth. He told the Court that "Mr. Doherty ran into us" and that the other car was about three feet over the centre line when his car turned.

Cross Examination Under cross examination he said he would not estimate the speed of the Doherty car, but it appeared to be coming fast. After the accident there seemed to him to be about three feet between the rear end of the cars when they came to rest. He briefly described the damage to the car in which he was riding.

Mrs. Shepherd, wife of the defendant, said she was riding in the back seat of the car with two young children. She corroborated previous testimony as to details prior to the collision. She stated that as they came to the corner of Grafton and Weymouth streets her husband pulled out from the curb to make the turn east. The traffic light was green.

She first saw the Doherty car past the Vocational School and when their car straightened away they were near the centre of the street. She would not say they were over the centre line. The other car was coming pretty fast, she said, near the centre of the street and the two cars crashed. The impact knocked one of the children off the rear seat and she bent down to pick him up.

The witness said she got out of the car and walked over to the other machine which she then recognized as a taxi. She said Mr. Doherty did not get out of his car until the Police arrived.

Questioned by Mr. Foster she said she saw her husband turn the wheel to the right, as did Mr. Doherty, as both tried to avoid a collision. After they collided she saw the plaintiff straighten out his car. It was right to the white line, she said.

She also told Mr. Foster that the following day she had telephoned plaintiff at the request of her husband who is deaf and does not hear well on the telephone. The purpose was to see what the parties to the accident would do.

Brand New Bags For Island Potatoes

The following statement has been released for publication by Mr. S. G. Peplin, technical advisor to the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board: "Once again the potato trade is up against the used or dirty bag situation. Many farmers obtain new bags in the fall, use them for harvesting over and over again until they are thoroughly impregnated with dirt, and then insist that they be accepted for shipment as new bags. "Both seed and tablestock inspection regulations require new bags for all shipments. "Every dealer knows that a nice clean package on arrival at destination is half the acceptance of the carlot. On the other hand a carlot containing a lot of dirty and in some instances broken or repaired bags, creates such a bad impression that immediate rejection may well result. "This practise of shipping used, dirty bags should be stopped now at the commencement of the shipping season. All shippers, loaders and truckers are being notified that all lots containing used bags will be rejected. Growers are therefore warned accordingly. "Nine times out of ten the package sells the goods. A good product calls for a good package. Eye appeal and that means the package, sells more goods to consumers than ever before."
