Edmonton Surgeon Makes Canadian Medical History

EDMONTON (CP)—An Edmonton surgeon Saturday became the first Canadian doctor to use a new neuro-surgical instrument to combat the effects of a nervous disorder in a patient.

In discussing the technique Dr. Moncton and assistants, Dr. C. Bertrand, Montreal, Dr. J. Hilliard and Dr. H. Toupin, of the University of Alberta's neurology department discussed the theoretical background to the case.

Dr. T. J. Speckman performed the operation on a middle-aged man suffering Parkinson's disease, an ailment which disturbs the motor system that controls arm and leg movements.

The operation was watched by twelve attending the annual scientific meeting of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons at Edmonton.
