

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special despatch to Examiner:

LONDON, July 22.

Sir Garnet Wolseley has arrived at Laonaco, Island of Cyprus.

The single scull race for Wingfield sculls came off to-day on the Thames course. It was from Putney to Mortlake, and there were but two competitors—Playford, the present holder of the sculls, and A. Payne, of the Moulsey Rowing Club. Playford was never headed, and although the race was at one time very close, it was won easily at the finish by Playford; time 24 m. 35 sec.

The Standard's Vienna correspondent telegraphs that he can vouch for the accuracy of the statement that Prince Bismarck, not long since, informed the Italian Ambassador that it was of paramount interest to the German race that Trentino and the City of Trieste should never become Italian.

BELIN, July 22.

The National Liberals admit that they expect to suffer some losses in the approaching elections for members of Reichstadt; but think that they will maintain a majority in that body.

LONDON, July 22.

The Times published, officially, a paragraph denying that Lord Dufferin consented to prolong his term of office as Governor General of Canada, and announcing that he will leave Canada in September.

OTTAWA, July 22.

The Minister of Militia arrived here to-day.

The crops are so heavy in some parts of Ontario that farm hands enough cannot be had to gather the grain. The wages offered are \$2 and \$2.50 per day.

DORCHESTER, July 22.

Annie Parker's cross-examination finished to-day. Her evidence is substantially the same as previously given.

We note that the Rev. Ronald McDonald, of Miscouche—whose ability and eloquence as a temperance lecturer is widely known—is to preach the temperance sermon in the Cathedral.

3. To educate its members socially, morally and intellectually; also to assist the widow and orphans of deceased members.

5. To establish a Widows' and Orphans' Benefit Fund, from which, on the satisfactory evidence of the death of a member of the Order, who has complied with all its lawful requirements, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars shall be paid to his family, or those dependent on him, as he may direct.

The gentleman who is endeavoring to promote this Society is the Rev. Wm. Full, formerly of this Island. Dr. Richard Johnston has been appointed physician to the Society for Charlottetown, and will examine any who may desire to become members.
