A letter from Estelle Bonness Provincial Conference on Education committee was appointed to look

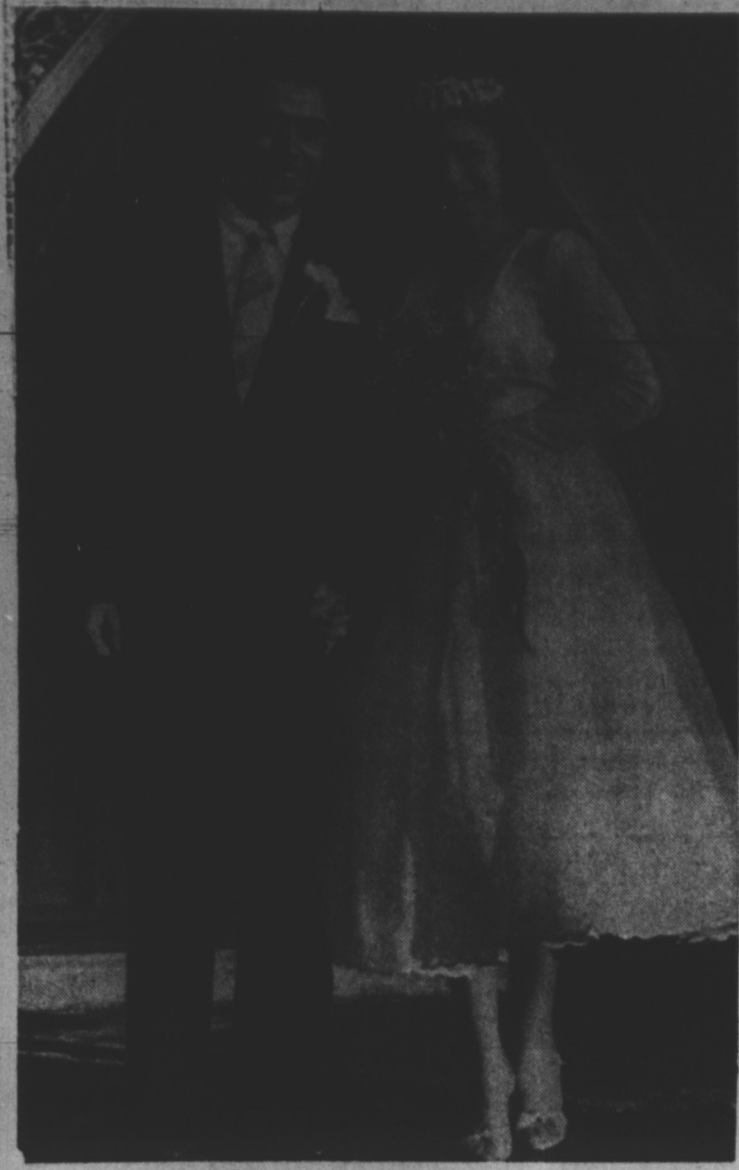
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MR. AND MRS. PETER M. PATE
